An article from the Bishop of Dudley, Martin Gorick

I spent the first two weeks of August on a prayer pilgrimage around the diocese. I last did this in 2021 when I visited over 100 churches and loved meeting so many people in diverse and wonderful parishes, praying for God's Spirit to flow and bless our churches and communities.

This year I have been visited fewer parishes but spent longer in each one 'Praying for Growth'. In each church we prayed for our growth as Kingdom People, growing in love, compassion, justice and freedom. We prayed for the growth of our church communities in depth and in number, as we seek to worship God, make new disciples, share hope and join with others to transform our communities for good and for God. We prayed for the growth of healthy and sustainable churches in every community, churches that reflect and connect with their local community, churches that are rich centres of diversity and inclusion, where old and young come together to make a difference together. We prayed for the growth of the numbers of children and young people connecting with our churches and bringing their faith and commitment into the centre of church life. And we prayed for the growth of congregations old and new, traditional and more alternative. Each service was special for me, as we moved together around the church in song and in prayer, and people received

anointing as we asked for the grace of the Holy Spirit to equip them for mission and ministry.

If you couldn't be there, you can still be part of these ongoing prayers for growth. Prayer needs to underpin everything, and there are Praying for Growth leaflets with intercessions, and a Praying for Growth card with Prayers for our Vision and our Priorities. The Charity is pleased to invite Students to apply for an Education Grant.

To qualify for a grant, you must meet the required age as at 1 September 2023.

You must also be a permanent resident of the TOWN OF EVESHAM or, if living away from home during term time, maintain a residential address in the TOWN.

All applicants must provide documentation to evidence their residency. Applicants aged 25 and over are also subject to a financial assessment.

The categories are as follows:

CATEGORY A: Full or part time, HND, Degree level and Postgraduate courses at a University or College.
Age: 18 to state retirement age.

CATEGORY C: Part-time vocational or educational courses, other than degree level. Courses must be classed as a part time course by the educational establishment and can be part of a modern apprenticeship/day release. 'SS Suevic - A Tale of Shipwreck and Survival'

The SS Suevic was a steamship, built specifically to service the Liverpool-Cape Town-Sydney route. She ran aground in a storm near the Lizard Point in Cornwall 116 years ago, in 1907. It is a truly remarkable story. 456 people were rescued by the RNLI over some 16 hours with no lives lost. This is still the largest number of people rescued by the RNLI in a single operation. **Galen Bartholomew** is a keen family historian. Two of his relatives were amongst those rescued.

The story of the discovery of Richard III in a car park in Leicester in 2012 is well-known. What is perhaps less well-known is the story of what happened subsequently. Described as 'The man Leicester Cathedral chose to bury a king', **Revd Pete Hobson** offers a unique perspective on Richard's final journey from discovery to reburial. For Pete, this was a once in a lifetime project. There was no precedent for reburying a king and the eyes of the world were watching closely. The subject of many books and a recent film, the story of Richard III is one that continues to capture the imagination. Pete Hobson is author of *How to Bury a King – The Reinterment of King Richard III*.

Reflecting Faith Series: Pews and Chairs

The Revd Dr Jo White continues her series on finding faith in the fabric of our church buildings.

Most of us think of pews as having been installed at the same time the church building was built, with occasional upgrades over time. But that's not the case. Originally church floors consisted of little more than stone flags or beaten earth on which grasses or rushes were lain as a renewable winter covering for cleanliness and insulation. Each year, in late summer, the old and rotten rushes were cleared out and new ones taken to the churches in carts. There are still a number of English towns, in particular in the north of England, that celebrate 'Rushbearing' each year.

The people stood for all the services. However, it was recognised that the infirm and elderly needed support, and stone benches - often backless – were placed by the walls for them. It was not until the Protestant Reformation in the 1500s that wooden pews were introduced for everyone to be able to be seated.

Naturally, people being people, there were pews and then there were *pews!*

Society was organised in classes or hierarchies and the richer and more important folk had the best seats near the front so they could hear what the priest was saying and watch the service.

One's place to sit was arranged by your place in Society, so the poorer and least important were at the back.

Sermons alone could be lengthy; two hours was not unusual, and if you could pay for privacy to doze off and some form of personal heating for winters, then clearly that made sense.

Have a look at the seating in a church near you. Are all the chairs or pews the same? Are some more elaborately decorated or larger? Is there a difference between the pews in the nave for the congregation and those for the choir and different again in the sanctuary? Does any of this reflect your faith?

RECIPE - Blackberry and Bakewell Pudding

INGREDIENTS

- 225 g (8oz) blackberries
- 50 g (2oz) blackberry jam
- 175 g (6oz) butter, softened
- 75 g (3oz) caster sugar
- 3 large eggs, beaten
- 175 g (6oz) ground almonds
- 40 g (1 ½oz) plain flour
- 50 g (2oz) icing sugar
- juice 1/2 lemon
- 2 tbsp. flaked almonds, toasted

METHOD

1. Heat the oven 180°C (160°C fan) mark 4.
2. In a medium bowl, mix together the blackberries and jam. Spread evenly over the bottom of a 1 litre (1¾ pint) baking dish.
3. In a large mixing bowl, beat the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy. Beat in the eggs gradually, then gently fold in the almonds and flour.
4. Spoon this mixture over the blackberries and smooth the surface.
5. Bake for 45min.
6. Sieve the icing sugar into a small bowl and whisk with just enough lemon juice for a runny yet thick icing. Use a teaspoon to drizzle over the bake and top with toasted, flaked almonds.

A Grain of Sand at a Time

This autumn, do you feel overwhelmed with all the things that you need to get done?

Then think of your life as an hourglass. There are thousands of grains of sand in the top of the hourglass; and they all pass slowly and evenly through the narrow neck in the middle.

We are like that hourglass. When we start in the morning, there are hundreds of tasks which we feel that we must accomplish that day. But if we do not take them one at a time, and let them pass through the day slowly and evenly, as do the grains of sand passing through the narrow neck of the hour glass, then we are bound to break our own fragile physical and mental structure. Do not attempt more than God designed you to do.



REMEMBERING THE GENIUS OF JRR TOLKIEN

Fifty years ago, on 2 September 1973, JRR Tolkien, the fantasy writer, poet, scholar and educator, died. He was best known for his novels *The Hobbit* and *The Lord of the Rings*.

Born in Bloemfontein and descended from a family that originated in an area that was then East Prussian and is now Russian, Tolkien – always known as Ronald – thought of himself as unmistakably English. He was brought up in the Birmingham area after the death of his father, who had stayed in South Africa while his wife and children visited England.

Ronald's mother then died when he was 12, and he was raised by aunts, uncles and a guardian who was a Roman Catholic priest. Tolkien later became a devoted Catholic. His beliefs were a significant factor in C S Lewis's conversion to Christianity.

Tolkien had a longstanding fascination with language and became an acknowledged expert in both linguistics and mythology, which led to his writing his two most famous works.

The huge success of his writing led to unexpected fame. After his wife's death in 1971, he was given rooms in Merton College, Oxford. He said in an interview shortly before his death: "A pen is to me as a beak is to a hen."

Since 2003, The Tolkien Society has organised Tolkien Reading Day, which takes place on 25 March in schools around the world.

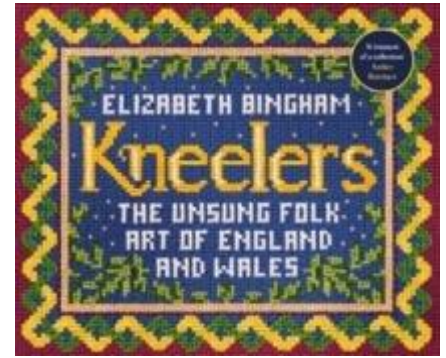
FIGHTER PILOT WHO WAS FAMOUS FOR HIS CHILDREN'S STORIES

Before he became one of the world's best-loved storytellers, Roald Dahl was an RAF fighter pilot, intelligence officer, and diplomat. Born in Wales on 13 September 1916, he had a fascinating life before becoming an author. He was named after the Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen, and at an early age developed an adventurous spirit.

After school he worked for Shell Petroleum in Tanzania, and then became an aircraftman for the Royal Air Force in 1939 – just as World War II began on 1 September 1939. After surviving a desert crash landing and the Battle of Athens, Dahl was appointed assistant air attaché at the British Embassy in Washington, DC. Roald Dahl's military career inspired his early writing. His first published story recounts his crash landing. He also drew inspiration from Great Missenden in Buckinghamshire, the village his family called home. He wrote over 30 novels, including *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* and *James and the Giant Peach*, also creating other iconic characters including *Willy Wonka*, *Matilda*, and *Mr Fox*.

Have we got pews for you?

This eye-catching headline was in *The Times* one Sunday in July. It was a book review about church kneelers, or hassocks as they used to be called, used when kneeling and praying to save your knees from the cold hard floor. Although they remain in many cathedrals and churches, they are not used as much as they were in the past, many people preferring to stay seated with heads bowed, instead.



The book covers pretty much everything you might want to know about kneelers, how they started in the 1930s when artist Sybil Blunt designed choir stall cushions for use in Winchester Cathedral. The cathedral invited Louisa Pesel to train volunteers to make embroidered cushions, kneelers and other items. The designs incorporated motifs and patterns inspired by Winchester history and architectural features of the cathedral. By 1936 a total of 360 kneelers had been made. The idea spread and kneelers in other cathedrals and churches were created with a wide range of designs from Biblical scenes to plants and wildlife, public figures and local clubs among other, more unusual topics.

The book, which is called *Kneelers: The Unsung Folk Art of England and Wales* by Elizabeth Gingham. (Hardback book priced £15.99 on Amazon) is a comprehensive and witty history of kneelers with many beautiful full colour images. The author is the leading authority on Anglican church kneelers and has also set up the Parish Kneelers website parishkneelers.co.uk.
