

An article from the Archdeacon of Dudley, Nikki Groarke Running The Race Set Before Us

In August (as I write this) I often have the joy of several weeks of meetingfree evenings – otherwise a relative rarity for clergy! I love it when this coincides with athletics on TV, so when I am not out running, I can watch other people doing so much faster than me! This year it's been the World Athletics Championships in Budapest. A highlight for me was Katarina Johnson-Thompson winning gold in the heptathlon. Not just because she is a brilliant all-round sportswoman, but because the journey she has been on is so inspiring.

We can learn much about the life of discipleship and growing as kingdom people from the dedication of sportsmen and women. Discipleship involves spiritual disciplines of prayer and worship, and a training regime of sorts, and in the epistles, we are encouraged to 'run the race set before us', to persevere, to fix our eyes on the goal.

KJT, as she is known, has struggled with injuries and setbacks since her last gold medal in 2019, to the extent that she describes a loss of love for her sport, doubts and dwindling confidence, swayed by the negative comments she dwelt upon. She almost gave up. But she has spoken frankly about choosing to stand up to the doubters, and to believe there was

more. She got a new coach and got back to training. On winning she said, "I committed to the vision and committed to trying again. I committed to getting my heart broken - and this time I didn't. It's all come good and I'm so happy."

Some of us may feel from time to time like giving up on our Christian journey of discipleship. Maybe we occasionally lose hope that the church we have been part of for so long can ever become healthy and thrive again. We listen to the doubters, the negative press, and wonder if it's really possible for our church to grow.

But let's persevere, take the risk of trying again, being vulnerable to disappointment, and see what God does. My experience is that God is faithful even when I lose heart, that when I find a vision, I can commit to, my faith begins to stir again, and the race once more seems winnable.

We have a vision in this diocese to grow as Kingdom People in healthy and sustainable churches, to see a hundred new worshipping communities formed, healthy churches in our largest population areas resourcing others, and double the number of children and young people engaging with faith. That's a vison I can get excited about, and I hope you can too.

The Dean of Worcester retires after 16 years



The Dean of Worcester, the Very Reverend Peter Atkinson, will officially retire on Friday 25 August, after more than 16 years in the post, and 43 years as a priest in the Church of England. His resignation was accepted by Queen Elizabeth II very shortly before her death.

Peter was installed as Dean of Worcester in 2007. Born and brought up in Kent, he studied in Oxford, Cambridge, and Rome, before he was ordained deacon in 1979, and priest in 1980. He

served as a curate in Clapham in south London after which he was Priest-in-charge of St Mary, Tatsfield, in Surrey. He was then Rector of Holy Trinity, Bath, after which he moved to Sussex to be the Principal of Chichester Theological College, and after that Rector of Lavant. He was Canon Chancellor of Chichester Cathedral from 1997 to 2007.

Peter married Lynne in 1983, and they have three children and three (soon to be four) grandchildren. They are now moving to Kirkbymoorside in North Yorkshire.

During his time as Dean, the Cathedral has seen the completion of the restoration programme inaugurated in the 1980s, and the unveiling of a plaque by The Queen on her Diamond Jubilee visit; the restoration of the Edgar Tower; the restoration of the east and the west windows; the conservation of Christ in Majesty, the mediaeval sculpture in College Hall; a series of projects to do with the historic library; the refurbishment of the vestry in the song school; and the remedial work following the collapse of a pinnacle in 2021. Perhaps the most striking project was the award-winning conversion of the medieval Undercroft to become a centre for the Cathedral's learning programme and wider community use. A project to relandscape College Yard has also been launched. The Cathedral's choirs have been restructured to give equal opportunities to girls and boys, and the Cathedral is now committed to a comprehensive and ambitious eco agenda.

Peter has been the Master of St Oswald's Hospital (the ancient almshouses in the Tything), a governor of the King's School, a member of the Worcester Conservation Area Panel, and a trustee of the Worcester Festival. For ten years there was an annual Shakespeare production in the Cathedral, in which Peter always had a part. In 2014 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Letters by the University of Worcester.

In 2008, an introduction to the Bible which Peter wrote for young readers, entitled The Lion Encylopedia of the Bible, was published by Lion Hudson. Earlier this year, a collection of his sermons, entitled <u>A Way of Putting It</u>, edited by Michael Brierley, was published by Sacristy Press.


St Mary the Virgin, Sedgeberrow

Reflecting Faith Series: Seating in Churches

The Revd Dr Jo White continues her series on finding faith in the fabric of our church buildings.

In many 'old' churches and cathedrals today the original wooden seats or pews have been completely removed. They have been replaced by moveable chairs, to enable the space to become very flexible. In this way concerts and exhibitions can more easily take place.

But where does the priest or worship leader sit?

Often there will be a special chair or 'stall' set aside for them. In older churches, you may find as many as three.

The first is a 'prayer stall' between the choir stalls and the nave. From here the priest will conduct the majority of the first section of the Sunday service, and during the week will use this stall for their morning and evening public office.

There is likely to be also a chair for them in the sanctuary, and in older church buildings you will see in the chancel area some seats (sedilia) set into the wall. Depending on the size of the original parish, these vary from being a single plain seat for the priest alone to something quite ornate: seating up to four people. They even come stepped, so that the people are sitting at different heights.

In medieval times, during Mass, the priest was the celebrant, the deacon read the Gospel and the sub-deacon read the Epistle. They would be seated in the sedilia while the Creed and Gloria were being sung, giving them a time of rest during a long ceremony.

Where the seats are at different heights, the priest would have sat on the highest one, nearest the altar. Later when Chantry endowments provided some churches with several clergy in full orders, the seats were all made at one level. Where there are four seats, the last would have been for the clerk.

In many churches nowadays, you have to look very carefully for these seats, as over time they have been rearranged, and sometimes even the floor around them has been raised so they no longer look like seats.

More modern churches also need somewhere for the priests and deacons to sit, and often you will find very fine chairs placed near the altar for them.

This month: What happens when the bishop comes to your church? Where does he/she sit? How do you know? What does the formality or informality of these chairs say about the way your church thinks about these roles?



Bible Sunday - 29 October

At the recent Coronation the King was given a Bible with the words 'the most valuable thing that this world affords'. As Bible Sunday is celebrated this month, let's ask why we should read the Bible?

The Bible isn't a single book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over 1500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking at the end times). Despite having a number of different writers, it claims one authority - God Himself! 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and equips us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us when we read: 'when the Spirit of truth comes, He will guide you into all truth' (John 16:13).

How should we read the Bible? Let's consider the following guidelines:

Right time: We need a regular routine, which will meet our needs. This will vary according to our circumstances: e.g., a mum at home with young children, somebody with a demanding job or a retired person.

Right Place: We need to find a space where we can be undisturbed (e.g. lounge, bedroom, train or kitchen).

Right Version: We need a version of the Bible which we can readily understand and use. Several versions are available (e.g. NIV, The Message), as well as Bible apps we can access on our phone.

Right Help: Reading notes also help us to understand a passage and apply it to our lives.

Ukrainians request more Bibles

The war in Ukraine has led to a dramatic rise in the demand for Bibles, as people ask existential questions about life and death.

The Ukrainian Bible Society reports that, in the last 15 months, some 700,000 Bibles have been distributed across the war-torn country. This is a five-fold increase on numbers handed out before the war. In 2020, some 136,767 Bibles were distributed in Ukraine.

Bibles are distributed around the country, including to soldiers and civilian communities on the front line, and to those in hospital. "Wherever the Bible is taken, it is very much appreciated," said a spokesman.

In September, we welcomed our new Headteacher, **Mr Turvey**, to the St Andrew's community. Here is what Mr Turvey said on his arrival:

"I hope that you have all enjoyed the summer break. It has been wonderful to welcome the children back to school this week and to hear the chatter and giggles fill the corridors and classrooms. As I have visited classrooms, it has been pleasing to see our pupils settling back into life at St Andrew's and enjoying the opportunities to learn. I am grateful for the warm welcome that I have received from the staff, pupils and community. A particular welcome to our reception, new nursery families and others who are new to the St Andrew's community. I am excited to get to know you all in the coming weeks."

At school, we have a daily act of worship based around a set of Christian Values which are relevant to everyone of all faiths and none. This half term's value is 'PERSEVERANCE'. The children are fully aware of the importance of persevering, both in school, and out of school. Some classes have recently looked outside the classroom at perseverance in the natural world and have learnt that many birds show remarkable



perseverance as they build their nests, piece by piece often in cold, wet and windy weather and at risk from predators. The long-tailed tit is just one example. Weighing just 9g, this little bird takes 3 weeks or more to build a nest. The oval shaped nest is made from moss, cobwebs and hair, covered on the outside with lichen and lined with up to 2000 tiny feathers. WOW!

The lovely weather at the beginning of September has allowed pupils to enjoy learning outdoors. Last week, After School Club enjoyed their al fresco snack and then used chalks to design some wonderful creations on the ground outside.

Also in September, Year 3 had a fantastic time at the Morgan Car Factory in Malvern. They learnt a lot about how a car is made and watched different people making different parts. They even got to hold parts of a car and take home some leather! It was such a fun and educational trip.

Everyone is looking forward to a busy term ahead, filled with lots of learning!

RECIPE - Cinnamon Apple Cake INGREDIENTS

- 210 g plain flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 150 g caster sugar
- 1 cup (approximately 1 large) red apple, peeled and roughly chopped
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 120 ml vegetable oil
- 120 ml Greek yogurt

Cinnamon topping

- 50 g caster sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted



Sugar glaze

• 30 g icing sugar, **sifted**

1-2 tablespoons milk


INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 C / 160 C (Fan)
- 2. Grease and line 8inch cake tin with baking parchment
- 3. In a large bowl add flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and sugar. Add chopped apple and stir briefly to combine.
- 4. In a separate bowl, add eggs, vanilla, oil and yoghurt. Whisk briefly just to break up the egg yolks.
- 5. Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and gently mix with a wooden spoon until combined. Be careful not to over mix. Spoon batter into prepared tin.
- 6. To make cinnamon topping, combine cinnamon, sugar and butter. Mix together until lumpy and wet, then sprinkle over cake batter.
- 7. Bake cake for approximately 30-35 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Transfer cake to a wire rack to cool completely.
- 8. To make the glaze, mix together sugar and 1 tablespoon of milk. Stir until smooth. If the glaze is too thick, add an extra tablespoon of milk. Drizzle glaze all over the cake.
