From the Bishop of Dudley

In this article for May editions of parish magazines, Bishop Martin explains where we are with the strand of our diocesan strategy to have at least one church in each major population area with a congregation of at least 150 people.



The Church of England has a vision of a church that is Christ centred and Jesus shaped. A church that is simpler, humbler and bolder.

We share that vision and want to see every parish, every benefice, every chaplaincy, every church school flourishing. Every church, every congregation is precious however small.

But within a healthy and sustainable ecology of churches we do need some that are larger. Some that can have thriving provision for youth and children; that can have excellent Sunday worship, and develop one or more new worshipping communities. We need some churches to be generating the leaders of the future and helping to train the leaders of today. Not every church will be able to do all that, but within each significant area of population we want to ensure that there is somewhere which can.

So one strand of our diocesan vision and strategy is to focus renewal funding in certain areas, to enable at least one church to grow to at least 150 people average weekly attendance across different services on Sunday and weekdays. We currently have very few churches that

come near that number, particularly in the north of the diocese. Only Top Church approaches that in the Dudley Archdeaconry, which has grown as a result of significant investment and inspirational leadership at local level. We now hope to replicate that growth in seven other centres of population and have obtained a significant grant from the national church to help us do that. This first phase of our renewal programme focusses initially on Kingswinford, Sedgley, Old Hill and Netherton, Pensnet/ Brierley Hill, Halesowen, Stourbridge and Redditch town centre. As these churches start to grow, we will also apply for funding to do the same in Bromsgrove and Kidderminster as phase 2 of the programme. Please pray for all those involved as we seek to grow healthy, happy, diverse churches that can flourish and thrive as centres of Christian love and faith for decades to come.

Remember we want to see every parish, every benefice, every chaplaincy, every church school flourishing and every church, every congregation is precious however small. For more information, contact me or Archdeacon Nikki.

Robin Hillman

Robin died suddenly on Wednesday 27 March, when he was at Church for the Compline Service. He leaves his wife, Laura, children and grandchildren. His funeral was held on Tuesday 23 April, and this is part of his daughter, Sarah's, tribute to him:

“Robin was born in 1941 in Bridgewater, Somerset, but spent most of his childhood in Herefordshire, where he attended schools in Leominster and Lucton. On leaving school, he went to read Chemistry at Swansea, part of the University of Wales. After graduating, he stayed on for an extra year to train as a teacher of Chemistry, Maths and RE. During his teaching practice, he met Laura, who was also training to be a teacher. They married at the beginning of April 1964. Sadly they missed their Diamond Wedding Anniversary by a few days.

Robin's first teaching job was at Marlborough Grammar School. After four years he moved to Bloxham School as Head of Chemistry. He was destined to spend the remainder of his teaching career here, becoming Head of Science, and also a House Master. During his time there he was involved in writing Chemistry text books, and was an A-Level chief examiner.

Robin and Laura's three children were born during this time, Sarah in 1968, Emma in 1970 and Nicholas 1972.

Robin retired in 1999, and he and Laura moved to Brittany, having been in love with France for a long time. They soon made friends, and helped to set up a chaplaincy for Anglicans living there.

Robin was involved with the Church from a young age, becoming a church council member at 16. He was licensed as a Reader in 1963, and carried this on right until the last few days of his life. He received a special certificate in Worcester Cathedral last October, celebrating 60 years of this ministry.

After twenty years in France, Robin and Laura moved back to this country, settling in Evesham just before the first lockdown. They had already joined St Andrew's Church by then, so were able to maintain contacts.

Robin was a very keen gardener, growing a vast range of flowers and vegetables. He also enjoyed classical music, Scrabble and Bridge amongst other hobbies.

Robin was always committed to whatever he undertook, setting high standards for himself and others, and giving his best in everything he did.

May he rest in peace.

Christian Aid Week – 12th – 18th May

Christian Aid is urging its supporters to “push back against poverty” this Christian Aid Week by bearing in mind the coming General Election.

The charity says that “people hoping to represent us” in the next UK Parliament will soon be on our doorsteps, “vying for our vote”.

Christian Aid says that these would-be MPs will: “be in listening mode, keen to hear what makes the voters in their community tick.” And so, urges the charity, Christians can use this opportunity to “show them that your church cares about poverty, and tell them that you expect them to act on poverty too, if they are elected.”

Why Whitsun?



Within the Anglican and Methodist churches the word Whitsun, Whitsunday or Whit Sunday is sometimes used instead of Pentecost. It falls on the seventh Sunday after Easter and commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Christ's disciples, and the birth of the church (as described in Acts 2). It used to be a tradition in some churches to baptise adults at Pentecost and the newly baptised people would wear white robes on that day, so Pentecost came to be called “Whitsunday” or “White Sunday” after these white baptismal

garments.

Whit Monday, the day after Whitsun, remained a holiday in Britain until 1971, then starting in 1972, the ruling Conservative Government decided to permanently replace it, after a five year trial, with a holiday called the Spring Bank Holiday on the last Monday in May.

What's the Big Idea – an Introduction to the Book of Judges

Following Joshua's death, a generation grew up who didn't know God (Judges 2:11) and 'every man did what was right in his own eyes' (17:6, 21:25).

The book of Judges is a study in God's response to a permissive society.

The book takes its name from the *deliverers* that God raised up during this time. God empowered both men and women with His Spirit to rule and deliver the people. They included Ehud, Deborah, Gideon and his son Abimelech, Jephthah and Samson. The judges operated in the 350 years (from 1050 BC) between Joshua's death and the monarchy.

We see a recurring cycle of apostasy, oppression, penitence and deliverance played out. When the people fell into sin, God sent an enemy nation to oppress them. As a result, they cried to God for help, and He responded by raising up a deliverer to free them.

The saddest words in Judges are those applied to Samson, *'He did not know that the LORD had left him'* (16:20). Rejecting God in our lives can begin with tolerating those things that are not in harmony with His will for our lives. The people's toleration of the beliefs of their pagan neighbours led to a conformity in life and worship with them. Yet God waited for His people to return to Him, when He responded with grace to deliver them.

Gideon stands out as somebody who was unwilling to compromise with the surrounding culture. Despite his weaknesses, God used him to deliver Israel from the Midianite invaders. We read: *'the Spirit of the LORD came upon Gideon'*, lit: *'the Spirit clothed Himself with Gideon'* (6:34). God's grace and faithfulness is at work in those who are prepared to trust Him.

Reflecting Faith: the church as a building

The Revd Dr Jo White continues her series on the meanings in church buildings by considering the stones and mortar

Today's church buildings are rich and varied in their designs, sizes, materials, plans and groupings; from large cruciform churches to simple single room designs; from red brick to stone, and so on.

I wanted to look up some information about the fact that today's church buildings, although they may be 'modern', are usually built upon or very close to a previous church building. In other words, they stand quite literally in a long succession of church buildings.

However, on entering 'church building footprint' into the computer search engine, it responded in a related but unexpected, to me, way: *'The Energy Footprint Tool is a great way of monitoring your church building's carbon usage and energy efficiency.'*

A very real issue for today's world! - and one we are very conscious about when we enter the building on a Sunday morning to find, even with the heating turned on for a number of hours, that it is considerably cooler than our own centrally heated homes.

Whilst it is theologically wonderful to have high ceilings, we can see how future remodelling might well lower the ceilings, bring in the walls, and shrink the glassed areas.

And so it has been through the ages – church buildings have constantly been amended.

When you look carefully at a church that is more than a few hundred years old, in any part of the world, you can trace the development of its use by its architecture. Perhaps you'll see a door or window bricked up or a new one opened. The widening of the nave by the addition of arches and one or more aisles. Change in stone or building materials as later technology was available or even a change in design as new techniques came into safe use.

RECIPE – Asparagus Soup

Following on from the piece about asparagus in last month's Herald, British asparagus is still in season in May, so you may want to include this simple recipe

INGREDIENTS

- Bunch of asparagus (230g), thinly sliced discarding very woody part
- 1 medium onion, roughly chopped
- 1 medium potato, roughly chopped
- 3/4 pint of water
- 1/3 of a chicken stock cube
- Salt to taste
- 1 tablespoon of oil and a good knob of butter
- 1/4 pint semi-skimmed milk



METHOD

- Sauté onion in oil and butter on medium heat until soft
- Add asparagus and potato and stir in water, stock cube and salt
- Cook for 20-25 minutes
- Liquidise and then add milk and heat to serve
- Serve with some nice crusty bread!

Alternative Soup Maker Recipe for Asparagus Soup

Ingredients

- 400 g asparagus (chopped into small pieces)
- 1 medium onion (chopped)
- 1 clove garlic (crushed)
- 1 medium potato (chopped)
- 2 sticks celery (finely sliced)
- 850 ml vegetable stock

Instructions

- Add all the ingredients to your soup maker.
- Optionally reserve some asparagus tips for garnish. You can fry them in a little butter and garlic while the soup is cooking.
- Set off on smooth.
- Serve and season according to taste.

Making Cream of Asparagus Soup

Once the soup make cycle has finished, stir in some cream (single or double), or yoghurt or creme fraiche.

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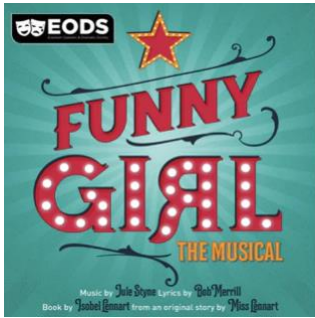

Don't Just Sit There!

The average adult in the UK sits for nine hours a day. Office workers probably clock up even more time in a chair.

But it is not good for you. Research has found that too much sitting increases your risk of weight gain, Type 2 diabetes, osteoporosis, depression, anxiety, stress, cancer, and even early death.

"Excessive sedentary time is associated with a plethora of physical and mental health complications," says Prof Lee Smith, an expert in physical activity and sedentary behaviour at Anglia Ruskin University.

And James Betts, professor of metabolic physiology at the University of Bath, says that sitting too much may also lead to weaker and less flexible muscles. "Using your muscles and loading your bones can definitely strengthen them – or conversely, disuse can rapidly make them weaker," he says.

The good thing is that too much sitting can be easily dealt with. Simply interrupt your sitting with activity breaks. Get up and walk around during every TV advert break. Walk around during phone calls. Go for a walk after dinner. Use the stairs whenever you can. The good news is that other studies have found that if you make time for even short bursts of exercise during your day, it will help to offset the harm of too much sitting.

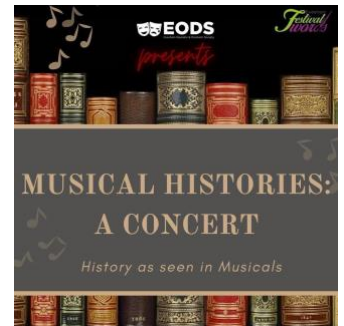
