From the Archdeacon of Dudley, Nikki Groarke

September often feels more like the start of a new year than January does! Many of us feel rested after a summer break, with fresh energy for the new term. It's often a really good time to check in with our priorities as a parish, making sure we are clear on our sense of direction, united in our aims.

The vision of the diocese as a whole is to grow as Kingdom People, sharing the good news of Jesus' love in Worcestershire and Dudley. As the body of Christ, we join to worship God, make disciples, share hope, and transform communities as we live out values of love, compassion, justice and freedom to bring about the kingdom of God on earth.

We are clear about these purposes, and our priorities for the coming years. We aim to:

- Double the number of children and young people worshipping in our churches.
- Create 100 new worshipping communities and range of ways for people to come and worship God.
- Invest in the renewal of around a dozen churches to ensure that each major area of population has at least one church with 150 people attending weekly, enabling them to support other local churches.
- Underpin these by investing in our clergy and lay leaders, providing training and development

opportunities to enable them to grow and feel supported and equipped for mission.

Bishop John has been wholeheartedly behind this vision, and in setting us on a direction of travel, he leaves a legacy for his successor to build upon. In setting out the Statement of Needs for the next Bishop of Worcester, we have been clear that we seek a bishop who will be excited to join in the adventure with us, inhabiting the role in their own unique way of course, but ready to come alongside us as we grow as Kingdom People together, bringing our long-term plans to fruition. So as the new term begins, it might be good to review these priorities in your parish. How are you planning to engage with more children, young people and their families, for example? Is there a New Worshipping Community you could begin to explore with Kim, our NWC Enabler's help, so that others can find a way to worship God? If you have been working with a Mission Accompanier, how is your Health and Sustainability Plan developing? How is your congregation sharing hope, making disciples and transforming your community? I look forward to hearing some of the encouraging stories emerging as your plans take effect over the coming months. May God bless you as you grow together.

From Dean Designate of Worcester, Stephen Edwards



I must find a way of explaining what I am doing over the summer without it sounding odd. When people as, 'what next?' I say I am going to disappear and then come back – **as the Dean**!

eyes'. You may remember the dry ice doorway through which contestants passed before returning as their chosen celebrity. 

What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Old Testament: Gospel of Matthew

This month we turn to the New Testament and look at Matthew, the first of the gospels. Although linked to Matthew the apostle, it is generally believed that the author used oral tradition, written fragments, eye-witness accounts, as well as common material in the other synoptic gospels (Mark and Luke).

Matthew, in writing for Jews, sets out to prove that Jesus is the true Messiah. He connects Jesus' birth, life death and resurrection with the Old Testament Scriptures. In fact, he quotes the Old Testament more than any other New Testament author. This is reflected in the opening genealogy which traces Jesus back to Abraham; in his use of the terms *kingdom of heaven* and *Father in heaven*, reflecting a Jewish reluctance to use God's name; and in the way he portrays Jesus as the *Son of David*.

The whole gospel is structured around five blocks of teaching (chapters 5-7; 10; 13; 18; 24-25). This fivefold division reflects the structure of the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament).

Matthew provides a comprehensive context by which we see all God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all parts of our lives (work, family, friends and future) completed in Him. At the end of his gospel, Matthew records Jesus' commission to His disciples share this good news, promising to be with them:

'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' (28:18-20)

Reflecting Faith: Arts and Crafts Churches

The Revd Dr Jo White considers the history of our village churches

Originally, the theology behind church building was to build church buildings on higher land, so that people would have to lift their heads to look upon them; with the tower or spire giving it extra height.

This was reflecting the faith of lifting our eyes to God and recognising our place in His Creation – and yet He still came to earth for us.

Often a clock would have been placed on the tower or spire for the local people who would not have had personal timepieces, and again they would have lifted their eyes heavenward to see it. The clock might have chimed, or would have been connected with the church bells to enable illiterate people to know the time.

There were 612 Commissioner churches built in the early 1800's, when society was becoming industrialised, and folk were moving away from rural life and into towns. By the middle of that century the Arts and Crafts Movement was well under way,

and church buildings were being 'targeted'.

Between 1884 and 1918 there were about 5000 churches built in the UK, of which around 350 can be identified as Arts and Crafts churches. Much depended on the Patron of the church and their generosity.

In East and North Yorkshire there are a set of 17 churches which were restored or built by the local patron(s) – father and son of the Sykes Family of Sledmere House – between 1866 and 1913. They say they are unparalleled elsewhere in Britain.

This month:

Have a look at a church near you and see if you can see the influence in it of this Arts and Crafts Movement. It was intended to make buildings less austere, more decorative, more 'emotive'. Do you think it does?

Status

The Great & Little Hampton Education Charity exists to provide financial support, at the Trustees discretion, to residents of the Parish who are under the age of 25 and engaged in education or an apprenticeship. The Charity can be contacted via email on <u>hamptoneducationcharity@gmail.com</u>

There are five trustees who meet three times a year. At our meeting in November we consider the main batch of applications for grants from students and decide how best to disburse the bulk of our income. We meet again in January/February to consider any special business which may have arisen, and we hold our AGM in May/June.

Report

The Charity made 33 grants during the year 2023-24. Fourteen students at college received £50 each (£700 total), eight home-based university students received £100 each (£800 total) and eight university students living away from home received £125 each (£1,000 total). Additionally, one student received a specific student grant of £200 to help with their overseas studies.

The Clerk confirmed that posters were put up in local retail units, and also sent to local schools, colleges and universities. The clerk also did a low-level social media campaign on the Evesham Noticeboard Facebook page. This resulted in an increased number of applications this year.

The balance of the investment fund at the end of October 2023 was £105,683.70. There was no change to the investment strategy.

The Chair of trustees for the year was Craig Jennings.

Councillor Emma Stokes joined as the Worcestershire County Council Trustee and Councillor Peter Scurfield joined at the Evesham Town Council Trustee.

Mrs Liz Shephard continued as Clerk the trustees have appreciated the efficiency of her work. Looking ahead we can be confident that because of the priority of the trustees in the past to safeguard the fund for future students and apprentices of Hampton Parish, that we will be in a position to fulfil the aims of the charity for many years to come. **Craig Jennings Chair**

Yoga Classes at Hampton Guide and Scout Hall

Through working on the physical body, we can make real, positive changes not only to our physical health, but also start to gain a sense of mental and emotional wellbeing and a quieter mind. RECIPE - Plum and Almond Traybake INGREDIENTS

- 25g Flaked Almonds, toasted
- 200g Self Raising Flour
- 175g Soft Light brown Sugar
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 150g ground almonds
- 3 large eggs
- 50ml milk
- 100ml Greek yoghurt
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

- 1/4 tsp almond extract
- 175g soft butter
- 100g marzipan, chopped into small pieces
- 8 ripe plums, stoned and halved
- FOR THE ORANGE ICING GLAZE
- 100g icing sugar
- 1 or 2 tbsp orange juice

METHOD

- Preheat the oven to 180C/160Fan/350F/Gas Mark 4. Grease and line a 20x30cm traybake tin with baking parchment.
- Toast the flaked almonds in a small frying pan over a medium heat, shaking the pan occasionally until the almonds are golden. Be careful not to burn them. Set aside to cool.
- Sift the flour, brown sugar, baking powder and ground almonds into a large mixing bowl.
- In a jug, combine the eggs, milk, yoghurt, vanilla extract and almond extract with a small whisk or fork. Add this mixture to the dry ingredients along with the butter. Mix well using an electric mixer until you have a smooth batter. Fold in the chopped marzipan.
- Pour the batter into the tin and place the halved plums on top. Sprinkle over the toasted flaked almonds.
- Bake for 40-45 minutes or until the cake is golden, risen and springy to the touch.
 Remove from the oven and leave the cake to cool in the tin completely.



- When the cake is cold, make the orange icing by mixing the icing sugar and orange juice together until you have a smooth icing that is thick enough to coat the back of a spoon.
- Drizzle over the traybake. Cut into slices and serve!
