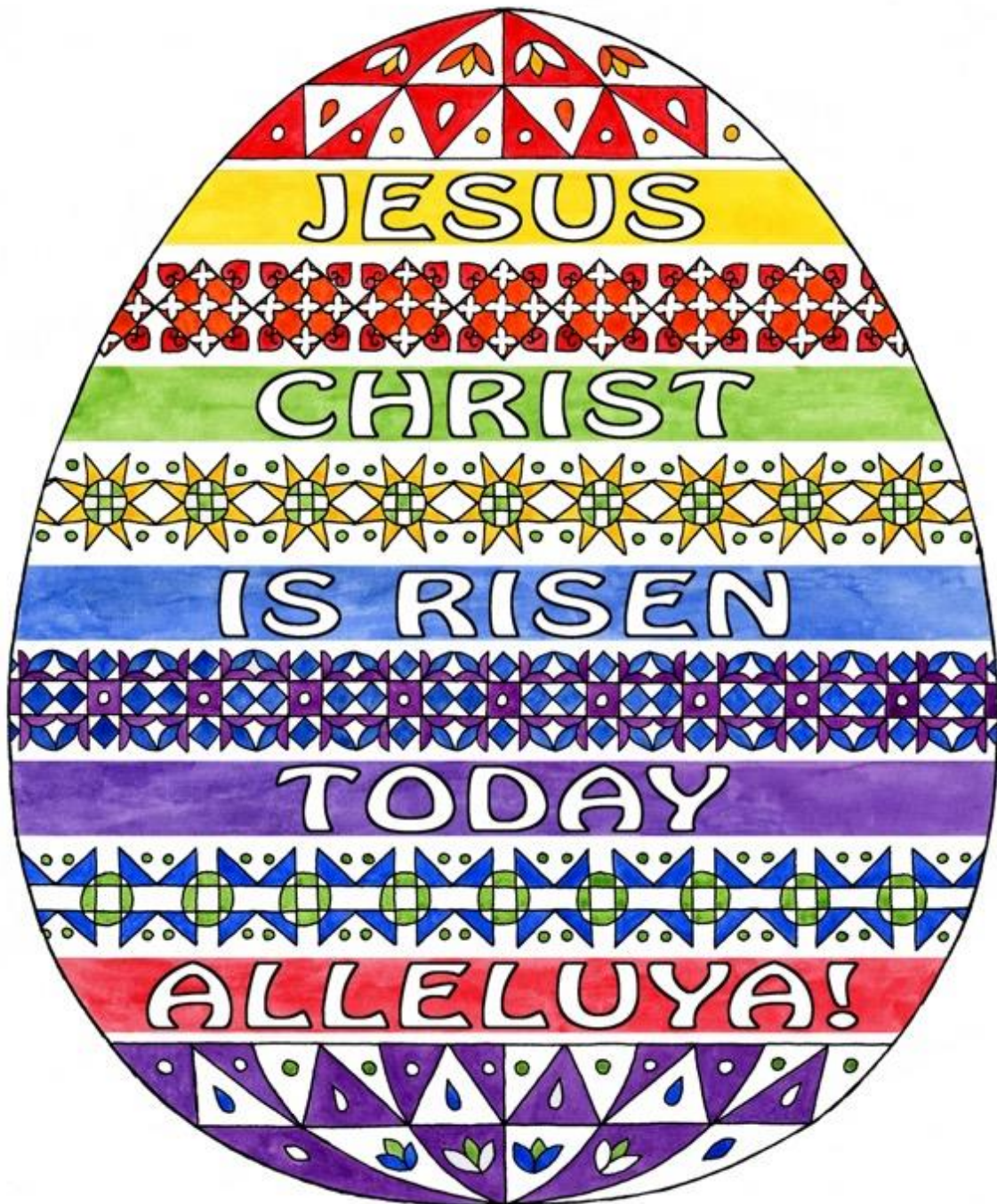

With Easter coming so late this year, and so much happening in the world, winter has felt long and dark for many. But, at last, spring has sprung and there are signs of new life all around. When the bright yellow daffodils appear, and the clocks finally go forward with the prospect of long summer evenings, it is easier to be hopeful about most things!

There are many signs of hope and green shoots in our parishes to celebrate too. As we continue to focus on our diocesan priorities we are seeing progress in each key area.

Those churches which have been enabled to appoint a Children and Families Worker with grants from our Healthier Churches Fund are reporting steady growth in their engagement with children and young people, towards our goal of doubling the numbers in our churches. We are also seeing good relationships being developed with many of schools as the Church and School Partnerships Awards grow in popularity.

traditions and in different contexts across Worcestershire and Dudley. I pray our hearts will be lifted as we prepare to share resurrection hope in this season, rejoicing in all God has done, and continues to do, amongst us.

The Name of Easter

No one is 100% sure where the English word 'Easter' comes from!

In pretty much every other European language, the word for the festival of Easter comes from a variation of the word 'Passover' (Pesach - פֶּסַח in Hebrew or Πάσχα in Greek).

One theory is that the word Easter comes from the Anglo Saxon month 'Eostremonath' which was about the time of year we now call April, when the Christian festival was held. The month might have been named after a German goddess 'Eostre', but the only reference to this name is from the early historian Bede in around 730 AD. And we're not 100% sure he was accurate! But having the festival named after the month it took place in seems to make sense. Sometimes 'Eostre' is associated with another goddess called 'Ostara' - the goddess of the dawn. However, that name was first connected to Eostre by Jacob Grimm (of Grimm's fairytales) in 1835. The word Ostara is in German manuscripts from the middle ages, but it's always for the name of Easter, NEVER the name of a goddess! Another theory (and the most likely) is that the term 'Ostern' (linked to 'Ostara') actually came from an early Latin term for Easter week 'hebdomada alba' (which means 'white week'). In Latin 'alba' means 'dawn' as well as 'white'. When the term was translated from Latin to Old High German, a mistake was made by using the plural term for dawn (ostarun), rather than white. So Easter became known as 'Ostern' in German and then 'Easter' in English.

The Dating of Easter

The Passover festival dates from about 4,000 years ago when Jewish people remember that God saved them from slavery in Egypt. Jesus was a Jew and so celebrated the Passover. Passover takes place in the first month of the Jewish New Year. The Jewish calendar follows the cycle of the moon, so the date changes a bit every year.

The first Jewish Christians added Easter celebrations to the Passover festival and because Jesus rose from the dead on a Sunday, so Easter Day became the first Sunday after Passover.

Unlike Christmas, when Jesus's birth is celebrated (although we don't know what time of year Jesus was born!), Easter is celebrated around the same time of year that he was killed. This is because Jesus died at the time of the Jewish Passover festival.

Over the years, the Christian festival moved in date slightly from the Jewish Passover, so they don't now have the same date, but sometimes they are very close! The Christian date for Easter also follows the moon, so it also changes every year.

Chocolate – food of the gods!

Did you know that the botanical name for the cocoa bean is *Theobroma* – which means 'food of the gods'? Millions of us obviously think chocolate is special – on average, each of us consumes 8.1 kilograms of it a year!

Certainly, chocolate makes us feel better. Some scientists believe that this is due to the chemicals it contains. These trigger the release of endorphins, similar to those we naturally produce when we fall in love.

But nutritionists warn against using chocolate as a pick-me-up, especially in the evening. Chocolate eaten before bedtime can cause your blood glucose levels to plummet during the night, which will disrupt your sleep. Chocolate eaten in quantity every day can lead to mood and energy swings, weight gain and poor immunity. If you have mad cravings for it, you could have a problem with blood sugar, or a deficiency in magnesium, copper, zinc or iron.

But occasional consumption of cocoa can provide medical benefits. Chocolate containing 60 per cent or more cocoa solids is rich in essential trace elements and nutrients such as iron, calcium and potassium, and many vitamins. Cocoa is also the highest natural source of magnesium.

Good as all this may be – most of us enjoy chocolate because of its high sugar and caffeine content. Chocolate simply gives you an instant sugar hit, providing a sudden burst in energy, unfortunately followed by a slump and then the desire for another sugar-fix!

What's the Big Idea? - An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament: Proverbs

The Book of Proverbs is an anthology of sayings (‘*mishle*’) that are generally attributed to Solomon (Proverbs 1:1), who uttered 3000 proverbs (1Kings 4:32). The purpose of these oracles is ‘*for attaining wisdom and discipline*’ (1:2). Solomon was concerned that people, especially the young, would understand ‘*the sayings and riddles of the wise.*’ (1:3-6). His guiding principle is that ‘*The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge.*’ (1:7).

To give an idea of the recurring themes in the book, here are a few examples:

Knowing God: ‘*The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding*’ (9:10).

Guarding Our Speech: ‘*A word aptly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver*’ (25:11).

Marital faithfulness: ‘*May your fountain be blessed and may you rejoice in the wife of your youth*’ (5:15-20).

Our Work: ‘*Go to the ant, you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise!*’ (6:6-11).

Dangers of Strong Drink: ‘*Wine is a mocker and beer a brawler; whoever is led astray by them is not wise*’ (20:1).

Justice and Honesty: ‘*The LORD abhors dishonest scales, but accurate weights are His delight*’ (11:1).

Underlying these sayings is a conviction about God's omniscience, ‘*For a man's ways are in full view of the LORD, and He examines all his paths*’ (5:21); providence, ‘*Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the LORD's purpose that prevails*’ (19:21) and goodness, ‘*The LORD is far from the wicked but He hears the prayer of the righteous*’ (15:29).

Proverbs reminds us that God is concerned with the way we live today. ‘*Wisdom is the art of living skilfully in whatever actual conditions we find ourselves*’ (Eugene Peterson).

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Reflecting Faith: Baptisms and Easter

The Revd Dr Jo White considers the time of year you were baptised

What time of year were you baptised? For the first few centuries of the Early Church, baptisms were only held at Easter, with the preparation being taught in the few weeks beforehand.

Leo I, Bishop of Rome from 440 to 461 AD, was a strong advocate of holding baptisms solely at Easter.

He wrote: "... for in the baptismal office death ensues through the slaying of sin, and threefold immersion imitates the lying in the tomb three days, and the raising out of the water is like Him that rose again from the tomb."

But, as the years went by and more adults began seeking baptism for their children, the practise changed. The Church was keen to not put any obstacles in the way, and so baptisms became a sacrament to be freely given at any time of the year.

This was especially important because for many years it was mistakenly thought that unbaptised babies should not be buried in a churchyard, and, even more importantly, would not get into heaven.

Thankfully the Church moved away from those wrong positions long ago. Now most of us were baptised when we were very young, often in our first few months of life, at any time of the year.

One thing is certain: baptising a child is not so that God will love them more. It is instead to say that the parents believe in God, and therefore intend to raise the child as part of the family of God.

This month: Have a think about your own Baptism. How old were you? Do you know – if you were a child at the time – why your parents chose that age?

London Marathon 2025 – Sunday 27 April

Last year's London Marathon attracted more than 53,000 runners, which made it the world's biggest annual one-day fund-raising event EVER. It also raised a world record-breaking amount of **£73.5 million** for charities.

The route is 26.2 miles long. Greenwich and Blackheath is the starting point, and then the route takes in Woolwich, Greenwich, Rotherhithe, Bermondsey, Tower Bridge, Limehouse, Canary Wharf, Isle of Dogs, Shadwell, Tower Gateway, Westminster Bridge, Great George Street, Birdcage Walk, Buckingham Palace and finally to the iconic finish line on The Mall.

It is all a far cry from the first London Marathon back in March 1981, when 6,747 people ran, and which did not raise any money specifically for charities.

RECIPE – Simnel and White Chocolate Cookies

Ingredients

- 75 g (3oz) whole skin-on almonds
- 125 g (4oz) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 100 g (3 ½oz) light brown soft sugar
- 100 g (3 ½oz) caster sugar
- 1 large egg, lightly beaten
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 275 g (10oz) self-raising flour
- 2 tsp. mixed spice
- 40 g (1 ½oz) each raisins and mixed peel
- 50 g (2oz) white chocolate, in chunks



Method

- Preheat oven to 200°C (180°C fan) mark 6. Spread the almonds out on a baking tray and bake for 5min, leave to cool, and then roughly chop. Switch off the oven for now.
- Meanwhile, put butter and sugars in a large bowl, and beat with a handheld electric whisk until light and fluffy. Gradually add beaten egg, whisking until incorporated, then whisk in the almond extract. Sift over the flour, mixed spice and ½tsp salt and mix on a very slow speed until combined.
- Add almonds, raisins, peel and chocolate and, using your hands, lightly knead in.
- Shape the dough into balls about the size of a golf ball – you can weigh them to ensure they are evenly sized; they should be 50g (2oz). Transfer to a lined baking tray and chill for at least 1hr to firm up.
- Preheat oven to 200°C (180°C fan) mark 6.
- Ensure the balls are spaced at least 7.5cm (3in) apart – you will need 2 or 3 baking trays. Bake the cookies for 10-12min, until golden brown and slightly cracked on top. They will be soft, but will harden on cooling.
- Leave to cool on the trays for 10min, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

NB If preferred small chunks of almond paste can be substituted for the white chocolate
