Next Bishop of Worcester announced



Downing Street has announced that His Majesty the King has approved the appointment of Hugh Nelson as the 114th Bishop of Worcester.

Bishop Hugh is currently the Bishop of St Germans in the Diocese of Truro, a position he has held since 2020, serving as the Acting Bishop of Truro from Sept 2023 until May this year. He is also Bishop to the Armed Forces, providing spiritual and pastoral leadership to Anglican Chaplains serving in the Royal Navy, British Army and Royal Air Force, a role which he will continue to hold as Bishop of Worcester.

Ordained in 2008, Hugh served his curacy in six rural parishes in East Kent before serving for eight years as the parish priest of Goudhurst with Kilndown, two village churches in the Diocese of Canterbury. Before ordination, Hugh spent 13 years living and leading the community of L'Arche London, part of an international network of ecumenical Christian communities where people with and without learning disabilities share life together.

Bishop Hugh said:

"It is an enormous privilege to be appointed as the next Bishop of Worcester. I am so looking forward to joining you in Worcestershire and Dudley on your journey as Kingdom People; getting to know the different communities across the Diocese and finding out what God is up to in its villages, towns and cities.

"The Diocese of Worcester is full of so much that is good and holy, with plans to double the number of young disciples, to create 100 new worshipping communities, to renew churches right across the area and to underpin all this by resourcing clergy and lay leaders. And all of that building on the faithful, generous service of people in churches of every size, tradition and place from Dudley to Bredon, and from Malvern to Redditch."

Welcoming Bishop Hugh to the Diocese

Bishop Hugh will be announced as the next Bishop of Worcester by young people at a 'Lightbox' event at St Helen's Church in Worcester. During the announcement day, he will meet adults and young people at the Wildgoose Rural Training care farm, where he will be welcomed by clergy and representatives of the Chaplaincy for Agriculture and Rural Life. Bishop Hugh will then go on to meet clergy and renewal church leaders at St Thomas in Stourbridge in the Greater Dudley Deanery; meet with the Diocesan Director of Safeguarding and have tea and cake with other diocesan and cathedral staff before finishing the day at Evensong in the Cathedral. Bishop Hugh is married to Lizzie, who is UK Director of Search for Common Ground. Hugh and Lizzie have four children in their teens and 20s. Hugh loves hanging out with his family, gardening and playing and watching football, rugby and cricket. He is delighted that he will be living opposite New Road Cricket Ground!

A message from Archdeacon of Dudley, Nikki Groarke

Our Wonderful Diocese

Back in June, I had the immense privilege of being part of the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) responsible for discerning who our next Bishop of Worcester should be. I am delighted by the outcome, and am looking forward immensely to serving alongside Bishop Hugh when he comes to join us in the new year.

A question posed during that process caused me to reflect on what I have learned about the Diocese of Worcester during the episcopal vacancy. Let me share a few of my observations.

In the Statement of Needs, describing the diocese for potential future bishops, we named our key characteristic as being **relational**. Relating well to one another across different traditions and contexts is part of Bishop John's legacy. What has really encouraged me, is that a year on, it is still a core part of who we are. Even during this season of change, with the natural uncertainty that comes during a vacancy, we have continued to relate well, bound together by our common commitment to be kingdom people.

Our **transformation journey** is exciting, and is bearing fruit as churches become healthier and more sustainable, we see more children and



young people being reached, and new disciples formed and nurtured. Each of the candidates we interviewed was inspired by our vision and impressed by progress so far, and I don't think that's just because they were

hoping to make a good impression! The clarity of our long-term plan, our clear priorities and the way we were able to engage people across the diocese in conversation have been praised by the national Vision and Strategy Team who often point others to us for advice on how to do it well. It was clearly a key factor in drawing potential candidates to explore whether they might be called to serve here.

We **navigate difference** well. The CNC process has been complex and divisive in some dioceses.

I came away with renewed hope for the future and an even stronger conviction that Worcester is the best diocese in the world to be part of!

I hope you will join me in your parish in praying for Bishop Hugh over the coming months as he prepares to come and join us on our transformation journey, and begins to build relationship with the varied and wonderful people across this fabulous diocese.

- ❖ Hampton and Evesham would join together as one Benefice.
- ❖ Norton and Lenchwick would leave Evesham, and join the same benefice as Harvington. All these churches would remain in the Asum group.

The PCC have been asked to consider this proposal, and the congregation have been kept in the picture.

In time a vicar would then be appointed, and until such time we will all continue to be supported by Bishop Robert Patterson.

We are very grateful to Bishop Robert for his support during the interregnum.

Licensing of LLM's (including Helen Black)

Worcester Cathedral on 7 September at 2.30pm

An "LLM" in the Church context stands for Licensed Lay Minister, a trained and licensed lay person who serves alongside ordained clergy to support faith, enable mission, and lead aspects of church life, like teaching, preaching, and pastoral care. LLMs have equal status to Readers and hold a nationally recognized license from their bishop, enabling them to minister in various settings, including their local church, community, and workplace.

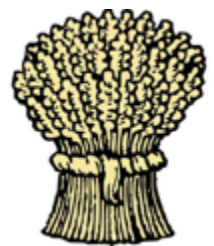
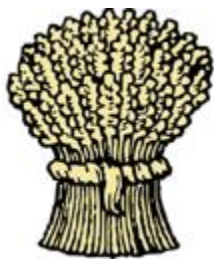

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: 2 Corinthians

'For anyone operating under the naïve presumption that joining a Christian church is a good way to meet all the best people and cultivate smooth social relations, a reading of Paul's Corinthian correspondence is the prescribed cure' (Eugene Peterson).

Paul sent four letters to the Corinthian church: one mentioned in 1 Cor. 5:9; 1 Corinthians; a 'severe' letter mentioned in 2 Cor. 2:3-4; and 2 Corinthians sent around AD 55 around a year after 1 Corinthians.

Paul had a number of reasons for writing this letter:

To express the joy he felt at their response to his painful letter (1:3-4; 7:8-9,12-13).

To share his troubles in Asia (1:8-11) and why he changed his travel plans (1:12-2:4).

To ask them to forgive those who had offended him (2:5-11).

To warn them not to be *"yoked together with unbelievers"* (6:14-7:1).

To explain the true nature of Christian ministry (2:14-7:4).

To encourage them in giving and completing the collection for the Jerusalem Christians (chapters 8-9).

To deal with the opposition (chapters. 10-13) and prepare for his coming visit (12:14; 13:1-3,10).

In this very personal letter Paul defends his leadership against accusations of inconsistencies in motives and credentials. A major theme concerns the relationship between suffering and the power of the Spirit. His opponents argued that Paul *suffered too much* to be a Spirit-filled apostle.

Paul responds by saying that his sufferings embody Christ's death and his endurance reveals God's glory: *'He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me.'* (2 Cor 12:9).

Lord's Prayer top of the recognisable quotes

"Give us this day our daily bread" topped a poll for the most recognisable words in the UK narrowly beating "May the force be with you" from the Star Wars films.

"Give us this day our daily bread" was recognised as coming from the Lord's Prayer by 80.3% of the 2,000 people polled. Surprisingly 89% of people said that they had prayed The Lord's Prayer at some point, including 88% of those who claimed they have no religion.

The Most Rev'd Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York, explained that the meaning is actually quite challenging, meaning 'give me what I need for today and stop me wanting more than my fair share' and that 'The whole human race urgently needs to learn what 'enough' looks like: so that the world is fed, but also in order for the planet to be saved'.

Other quotes included in the survey included Churchill's "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few"; "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times" from *A Tale of Two Cities* by Charles Dickens; "You'll never walk alone" from the Rodgers and Hammerstein song popularised by Gerry and the Pacemakers and sung by Liverpool football fans; "Happy and glorious, long to reign over us" from the National anthem and "to be or not to be" from Shakespeare's *Hamlet*.

The polling was done by Thy Kingdom Come, a global ecumenical prayer movement.

There are 5 trustees who meet 3 times a year. At our meeting in November we consider the main batch of applications for grants from students and decide how best to disburse the bulk of our income. We meet again in January/February to consider any special business which may have arisen, and we hold our AGM in May/June.

Report

The Charity made 31 grants during the year 2024-25 totalling £2,525 varying in value of £50 to £100 depending on what level they were studying and whether they were based at home or living away from home.

The application form and advertising poster were sent to the local schools, colleges and universities. An advert was also placed on the Evesham Noticeboard Facebook page. The application form was also emailed to all previous applicants.

The balance of the investment fund at the end of March 2025 was £114,169.37.

There was no change to the investment strategy.

The Chair of trustees for the year was Craig Jennings. Emma Stokes, Tracy Dresch and Peter Scurfield continued to serve as Trustees and Margaret Thomson joined as the ex-officio trustee replacing Mark Binney.

Mrs Liz Shephard continued as Clerk the trustees have appreciated the efficiency of her work.

Looking ahead we can be confident that because of the priority of the trustees in the past to safeguard the fund for future students and apprentices of Hampton Parish, that we will be in a position to fulfil the aims of the charity for many years to come.

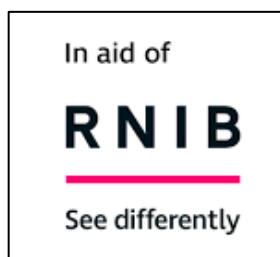

RECIPE – Mini Blackberry Bakewells

Ingredients

- 375g pack shortcrust pastry
- 1 tbsp plain flour
- plus extra for dusting
- 100g butter
- at room temperature
- 100g caster sugar
- 1 large egg
- 100g ground almond
- 150g punnet blackberry
- 25g toasted flaked almond
- clotted cream to serve (optional)



Method

- Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and stamp out 12 circles with an 8-9cm cutter. Use to line the holes of a bun tin. Chill while you make the filling.
- To make the filling, beat together the butter, caster sugar, egg, ground almonds and flour. Divide the filling between the tarts, pushing in the blackberries as you go. Scatter over the flaked almonds and bake for 15-20 mins until lightly golden.
- Remove from the tins and serve warm or cool, with a dollop of clotted cream if you're feeling indulgent.



Did you spot many butterflies this past summer?

The wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation is deeply worried about our butterflies. Or rather, the lack of them. It seems that more than 80 per cent of our species have declined sharply in number since 1970s.



Butterflies have been hit by climate change, the use of pesticides, and damage to their habitats. The drought this summer will have been bad news for their caterpillar offspring, which need growing plants to feed on.
