

A message from Martin, Gorick, Bishop of Dudley

This has been a tough year for many of our farmers, with many affected not just by uncertainties over taxation and subsidies, but by the hot and dry spring and summer. I saw cattle standing in parched fields with winter hay and silage being fed to them in August. There has been a mixed harvest for arable crops I gather, while many of our fruit farmers have done well, which is good news for them at least, an important part of the rural economy across Worcestershire. Jesus was very familiar with rural life, and spoke memorably of the harvest, When Jesus saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest. Matthew 9.36-38 Have you considered whether God is calling you to be a labourer in his Church? Benefice Office and Vestry

It is with great pleasure that we can now announce that work will begin on our vestry project.

Phase one will begin on the 16 September. Members of the PCC and church congregation have almost finished clearing the vestry. Thank you for all your hard work.

All items will be stored behind a temporary screen which will be constructed across the west end of the church (this should not interfere with the font). Once the work is complete, the main body of the church will return to normal. This is to enable the floor to be suitable for further development. Whilst this work is in progress, the vestry will be strictly out of bounds, so we may not always be able to provide refreshments after church services. No one can enter via the vestry doors.

It is our intention to provide an accessible toilet, kitchenette, storage, priests vestry and meeting area with the vestry space. This will be known as Phase Two.

We have raised the funds for Phase One to be completed, and Phase Two will begin once we have received grants, and funds from the sale of the Fairfield Church Centre.

We will continue to fundraise for the upkeep of our beautiful church.



What is a hero? From Rosemary Cross

I've just started reading a book about a man who famously said, "I am just going outside and may be some time." Lawrence Oates heroically tried to help his beleaguered companions in their quest to reach the base which would save their lives, by sacrificing himself, knowing that his weakness and illness was holding the others up. Ultimately, we know that his sacrifice was in vain as the other members of the Scott party were holed up in their tent during terrible weather and tragically succumbed to lack of food and the terrible cold, but that does not make Oates any less of a hero. We can think of many other examples of heroes such as Mountain Rescue Teams turning out to scour rough and precipitous terrain to search for missing walkers; or NHS staff working with dangerously infectious patients not knowing if they will catch the disease and die themselves or perhaps put their families at risk. So I must admit that it annoys me when someone who has handed in a missing purse or done a litter-pick is hailed as a hero. Kind acts such as these are one thing - heroism requires a lot more. Is there a War Grave in your Churchyard? If so, you might look at it for a minute or so and reflect on the heroism of the soldier lying there.

Give a little. Live a lot

Winston Churchill said this

"We make a living by what we get

We make a life by what we give"

Even if we give something very small, we can make life better for other people and for ourselves. Next time you go out give it a try - a door held open - a car let out from a side road - a few kind words to someone who is serving in a shop or café - a card to thank a friend for their help - these are all ways we can make life more pleasant, and we reward ourselves with a warm glow. We all know that the phrase 'It is better to give than to receive' rings true.

St Andrew's School and Nursery Governor Vacancies

St Andrew's School has been at the centre of the community in Hampton for well over 100 years. As Hampton continues to grow the governors are looking to strengthen the school's links with the wider community and would welcome approaches from anyone who might be able to help.

The core functions of the Governing Body of the school are to set the vision and strategic direction for the school, to hold the Head teacher to account for the educational performance and ensure the financial resources are well spent. There are at present nine governors including those appointed by the church or elected by parents. Governors done work alone but work as a team together with the Head Teacher and other staff members to carry out those functions. Governors bring their expertise and experience to support the work of the governing body. You don't need any experience of teaching to be a governor as training is available, and you'd get support from other governors. Serving as a governor is a very rewarding voluntary role.

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Galatians

Paul's letter to the Galatians has been described as the 'Magna Carta of Christian Liberty', because it emphasises the freedom that we have through faith in Jesus Christ. Paul vigorously defends the truth that people are justified ('made right with God') by faith in Jesus Christ alone. Our standing with God is not determined by what we do, but by dependence on what Christ has done.

It is generally believed that Paul wrote this letter in 48/499AD to the churches in the southern area of Galatia, which he planted on his first missionary journey. It was written before the Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15), making it the earliest of Paul's letters.

Paul is dealing with Jewish-Christians (or Judaizers) who were advocating ceremonial practices of the Jewish law, including circumcision, in addition to faith in Christ as the means of salvation. They were undermining Paul's authority as an apostle, by asserting that his gospel didn't agree with the apostles in Jerusalem.

In response, Paul defends his apostolic authority and presents the true gospel, by emphasising the unique importance of Christ and His cross in salvation. He argues that 'a person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ' (2:16). He appeals especially to the examples of Abraham (3:6-9) and Hagar and Sarah (4:21-21), who stand in contrast as being a 'slave' under the law and 'free' in Christ.

'It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.' (5:1). We are justified through faith alone and it is by faith alone that we live out our new life in the freedom of the Spirit.

Reflecting Faith: Glory to God

For the last few months we've been looking at the way that church services are put together.

Last time we looked at how we begin by recognising how great and amazing God is, and therefore apologise for all the things we've done wrong – or should have done and haven't – in the light of His 'perfection'.

We then receive God's forgiveness.

At this point, recognising how gracious and forgiving God is, we are asked to rise from our knees and stand together to give 'Glory to God'.

Known in Latin as 'The Gloria'.

You will recognise those words from those spoken by the angels announcing the birth of Christ to the shepherds on the hills over Bethlehem:

"Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth to people of good will" (Luke 2:15) Traditionally this 'angelic hymn' has been sung and begins with praise to God the Father. It then asks for the mercy from God the Son, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.

The final lines soar into the blinding mystery of the Trinity: 'Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father'. Because it is so full of joy it is not included in worship during Advent and Lent.

This hymn dates back to the third century of the Church. Tradition holds that it was first composed as a prayer in the East, and then translated to Latin by Saint Hilary of Poitiers around the year 360.

Because this hymn is so special over the years there have been limitations on who was allowed to sing or recite it. At first it was only bishops and then in the 11th century priests were allowed to do so.

Now we all sing or say it together. That means we take our place in our Christian heritage alongside those angels singing or saying it each week. What a privilege!
