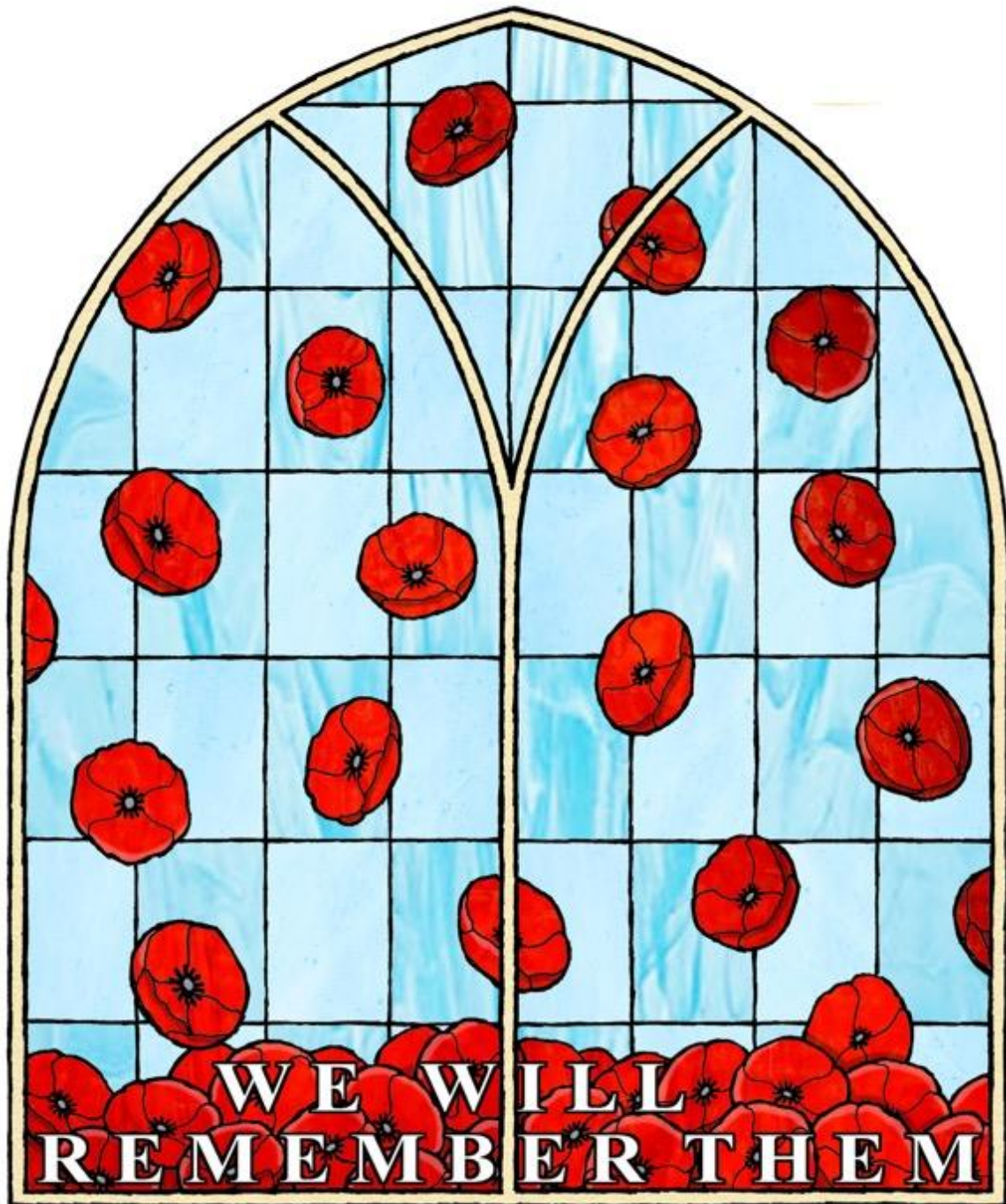

New Archbishop of Canterbury announced

His Majesty The King has approved the nomination of the Bishop of London, the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally, as the next Archbishop of Canterbury, Downing Street has announced.

The 106th Archbishop of Canterbury since Saint Augustine arrived in Kent from Rome in 597, Bishop Sarah will be the first woman to hold the office.



She will be installed in a service at Canterbury Cathedral in March 2026. Sarah Mullally has been the Bishop of London since 2018, the first woman appointed to that role, and before that was Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter. Prior to her ordination in 2001, she was the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England – the youngest person ever to be appointed to that role at the age of 37 – having previously specialised as a cancer nurse. Bishop Sarah has described nursing as "an opportunity to reflect the love of God".

The most senior bishop in the Church of England, the Archbishop of Canterbury's ministry combines many roles including serving as the Diocesan Bishop of the Diocese of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, as well as primus inter pares – or first among equals – of the Primates of the global Anglican Communion, which consists of around

85 million people, across 165 countries. In the House of Lords, the Archbishop of Canterbury is one of 26 bishops who comprise the Lords Spiritual.

Bishop Sarah said:
"As I respond to the call of Christ to this new ministry, I do so in the same spirit of service to God and to others that has motivated me since I

first came to faith as a teenager.

"At every stage of that journey, through my nursing career and Christian ministry, I have learned to listen deeply – to people and to God's gentle prompting – to seek to bring people together to find hope and healing.

"I want, very simply, to encourage the Church to continue to grow in confidence in the Gospel, to speak of the love that we find in Jesus Christ and for it to shape our actions.

"And I look forward to sharing this journey of faith with the millions of people serving God and their communities in parishes all over the country and across the global Anglican Communion.

"I know this is a huge responsibility, but I approach it with a sense of peace and trust in God to carry me as He always has."

Bishop Martin commented on the appointment saying:

"I am delighted to welcome Bishop Sarah as the next Archbishop of Canterbury. She is a proven leader, with a passionate commitment to Jesus Christ, who longs to see her church and country grow in faith, hope, love and joy. She can be assured of our prayers and support in Dudley and Worcestershire as she prepares to begin her demanding new role."

Biography of the new Archbishop:

Born in Woking in 1962, Bishop Sarah became a Christian at the age of 16. Before being ordained, Bishop Sarah worked as a nurse in the National Health Service, which she has described as "an opportunity to reflect the love of God".

She specialised as a cancer nurse and, at the age of 37, became the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England, the youngest person ever to be appointed to the post.

Bishop Sarah was made a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire in recognition of her outstanding contribution to nursing. She was ordained in 2001 and served her curacy in the Diocese of

Southwark, initially as a self-supporting minister, before leaving her government post in 2004.

In 2012, she was installed as Canon Treasurer at Salisbury Cathedral and three years later took the role as Suffragan Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter. On 12 May 2018, Bishop Sarah was installed as the 133rd Bishop of London at St Paul's Cathedral, the first woman to hold the role.

Bishop Sarah is married to Eamonn, and they have two grown-up children, Liam and Grace.

Appointment process – key dates:

The next stage of the appointment process is the Election by the College of Canons of Canterbury Cathedral, which will take place before Christmas. On **28 January 2026**, there will be a Confirmation of Election at St Paul's Cathedral in London, at which Bishop Sarah will legally become the Archbishop of Canterbury. In **March** there will be an Installation (sometimes referred to as an 'enthronement') at Canterbury Cathedral, which denotes and marks the start of the new Archbishop's ministry.

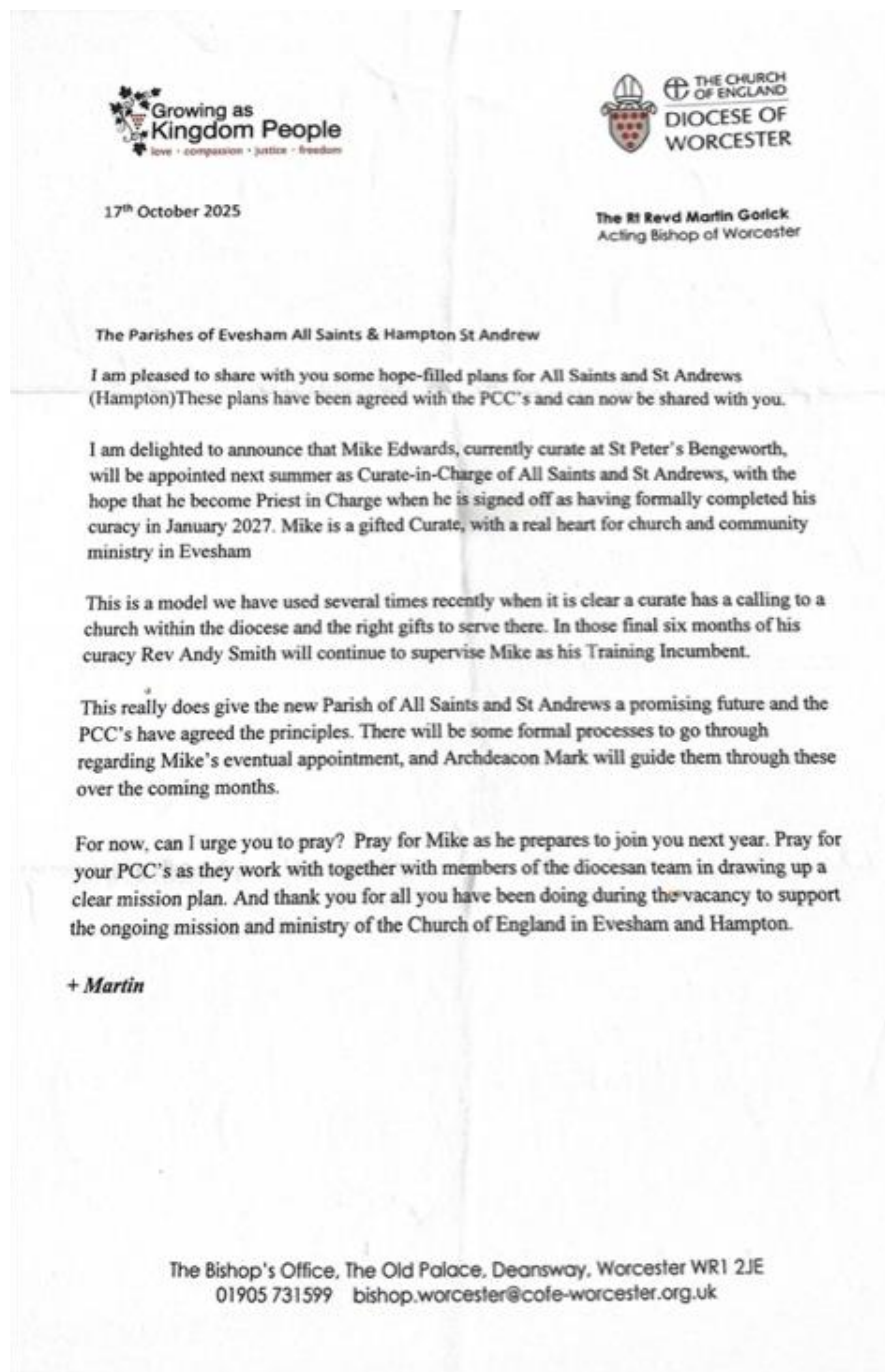

Letter from the Diocese regarding the Benefice

Transcript of letter on p7 from the Rt Revd Martin Gorick, Acting Bishop of Worcester:

The parishes of All Saints and Hampton St Andrew

I am pleased to share with you some hope-filled plans for All Saints and Hampton (St Andrews). These plans have been agreed by the PCC's and can now be shared with you.

I am delighted to announce that Mike Edwards, currently curate at St Peter's, Bengeworth, will be appointed next summer as Curate-in-Charge of All Saints and St Andrews, with the hope that he will become Priest in Charge when he is signed off as having formally completed his curacy in January 2027. Mike is a gifted curate, with a real heart for church and community ministry in Evesham.

This is a model we have used several times recently when it is clear that a curate has a calling to a church within the diocese, and the right gifts to serve there. In those final six months of his curacy Rev Andy Smith will continue to supervise Mike as his Training Incumbent.

This really does give the new parish of All Saints and St Andrews a promising future and the PCC's have agreed the principles. There will be some formal processes to go through regarding Mike's eventual appointment, and Archdeacon Mark will guide them through these over the coming months.

For now, can I urge you to pray? Pray for Mike as he prepares to join you next year. Pray for your PCC's as they work together with members of the diocesan team in drawing up a clear mission plan. And thank you for all you have been doing during the vacancy to support the on-going mission and ministry of the Church of England in Evesham and Hampton.

A book recommendation – but with a ‘not an easy read’ warning.

‘The Names’ by Florence Knapp tells of ‘sliding-doors’ scenarios, which follow the naming of a child. Does our given name shape and define us? New mother Cora goes to the Registry Office to register the birth, and three different names give us three different sets of circumstances. The idea is an original and intriguing one. and the book has been widely praised; however, there are incidents of domestic and other violence which may not be appropriate for some readers. Cora is an abused woman whose life is confined and diminished by her overbearing and violent spouse. Can she escape, and will her children bear the emotional scars of their Father’s actions? This moving narrative (with sections devoted to each name) is peopled with well-drawn characters, and heart-breaking storylines. The timeline follows the characters every seven years and is tied into reality by mention of events such as the great storm of 1987, and the attack on the Charlie Hebdo offices in France in 2015 among others, finally bringing us up to 2022. The choices we make in life determine our future, as this book powerfully demonstrates. ***From Rosemary Cross***

Reflecting Faith: Do we hear God's Word today

The Revd Dr Jo White considers how little we read the Bible

For the last few months, we've been looking at the way that church services are put together. After the Gloria each week, this we hear 'God's Word' as written in the Bible. This is usually three passages: one from the Old Testament, one from the epistles, and one from the gospels.

But **how much** do we hear of God's Word? Though we say we want to 'hear God's word', actually the amount we hear week on week is quite minimal.

In bygone days, when the 1662 Book of Common Prayer was universally used in churches, it brought with it a two year lectionary: (unlike today's three year lectionary: lectionary being the recommended or obligatory Bible readings for each day).

This gave congregations, if they came to daily services both morning and evening (which in those times they most likely did) during the course of a year, an opportunity to hear read *the whole Old Testament once, the New Testament twice and all the Psalms twelve times*.

What a contrast to today! In most UK churches, attendance is now at only one service each week, mostly on Sunday. During that service, perhaps 15 or 20 Bible verses might be read.

Now, there are around 31,100 verses in the Bible, which means that at a generous 30 verses a week the congregation will hear around 1,560 verses in a year – that's around 5% each year. So even on a three-year cycle, with a few extra readings for good measure, we hear no more than 20% of the Bible.

I suspect there are two key reasons for this diminution of Bible verses being read. Firstly, church services have got shorter and take up far less time. Secondly, congregations have become more literate, and so it is thought that they do not need it all read out to them.

It would be interesting to know how much of the read-aloud-Bible people heard and listened to and absorbed, in relation to how much do that today, with the shorter verses being read to them coupled with much shortened sermons.

This month

Next time you go to a Sunday church service listen to the Bible reading with keen ears. How much do you recall a few days later? How much of the Bible that you have not heard recently in church have you read for yourself?

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Ephesians

Paul wrote the letter of Ephesians around AD 60, while in prison at Rome. It was probably a circular letter to be read in the house churches of Ephesus and the local area. Paul founded the church over a period of three years (Acts 19:1-20:1) between 52-55 AD. Ephesus was the leading city and commercial centre in the region, famous for its temple to the goddess Artemis (Diana).

Paul's aim in writing his letter was to help his readers understand the dimensions of God's purpose and grace for them and His eternal plan for the church. The believers needed to understand their status *'in Christ'* and the call to live a life worthy of Christ. Ephesians is divided into two halves: chapters 1-3 concern theological issues, while chapters 4-6 deal with the practical outworking of faith. Having shown God's purpose for the church, Paul shows how God has reconciled individuals to Himself by grace (2:1-10). He has reconciled people to each other by breaking down the barriers through Christ's death (2:11-22). This is the *'mystery'* revealed by Paul (3:1-13) and he shows how Christ's gifts promote unity and maturity (4:1-16). The believer's new life stands in contrast to the old way of life without Christ (4:17-6:20).

The great overarching theme of the letter is that we are rescued by God not just for our personal benefit, but to bring praise and glory to Him in our lives: *'He made known to us the mystery of His will according to His good pleasure, which He purposed in Christ, to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfilment – to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.'* (1:9,10).

RECIPE – Thor Cake

A chewy, oaty cake with ginger, Thor cake is an autumnal favourite that's reminiscent of Yorkshire Parkin, traditionally served on Bonfire Night. It's thought to have originated in Derbyshire

Ingredients

- 200g unsalted butter, plus extra for greasing
- 125g black treacle
- 100g clear honey
- 1 tsp vanilla paste
- 250g oatmeal
- 250g plain flour
- 150g demerara sugar
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 100g candied peel, chopped
- 1 tsp ground ginger



Method

- Preheat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas 4.
- Grease and line a 23cm x 23cm square brownie tin with baking paper.
- In a small pan, gently melt the butter, treacle, honey and vanilla paste over a medium heat, stirring to combine, then set aside to cool a little.
- Mix the remaining ingredients together in a large bowl, and add a pinch of salt.
- Pour in the treacle mixture, stirring with a wooden spoon until all the ingredients are well combined.
- Pour the mixture into the prepared tin, spreading evenly, then bake for 20-25 minutes.
- Remove from the oven, then leave to cool completely in the tin before slicing into squares to serve.
