An article from Bishop Mark on Epiphany hope

January brings us into the season of Epiphany, a time when we reflect on the journey of the Magi and the light that guided them. Their story speaks profoundly to us as we begin a new year. The Magi travelled with hope rather than certainty, following a sign they only partly understood, yet trusting that the light would lead them to something – or someone – worth seeking.

In their long and patient journey we find encouragement for our own discipleship. The start of a new year often brings a mixture of anticipation and uncertainty, and few of us feel entirely prepared for whatever lies ahead. Yet Epiphany invites us to be people who are willing to look for Christ's presence in unexpected places, confident that God is already out ahead of us.

As the Magi followed the light, so we look for God's guiding light as we step into a new year. This year, that light shines particularly through the arrival of Bishop Hugh, whose ministry we look forward to welcoming and supporting. A new bishop brings with them not only leadership but fresh perspective, renewed energy, and a

reminder that God continues to call and equip people for service in the life of the Church. As Bishop Hugh begins his ministry among us, may we hold him and his family in our prayers, and remain open to the ways his presence will help us discern God's purposes for our diocese in the months and years ahead.



Epiphany also reminds us that the light of Christ is not for us alone. Like the star that guided the Magi, we are called to shine with hope for those around us. In a season when many feel weary or isolated after the intensity of Christmas, even small acts of kindness, hospitality, and prayer can illuminate someone's path.

As we step into the year before us, may our congregations be attentive to the quiet signs of God at work, eager to reflect Christ's light, and ready to walk alongside Bishop Hugh as we continue our shared mission.

Ministers' Blog – New Year 2026

Re-grouping the Churches

2026 promises to stir up an exciting new beginning in the life of our local parishes, not least at Hampton, Sedgeberrow and Hinton-on-the-Green.

Since Rev'ds. Mark Binney and Andrew Spurr retired, there has a pause for some careful and imaginative thinking about how the churches can be grouped together and staffed in the best way for the future. In summary, the plan is as follows:

- The church of Norton & Lenchwick is to be grouped with Harvington and the ARCH benefice, overseen by their new rector, Rev'd Glenn Redding;
- Sedgeberrow and Hinton churches are joining the Broadway and Childswickham group, under the leadership of Rev'd Shellie Ward;
- All Saints' Evesham and St. Andrew's Hampton will join forces as one benefice, sharing resources and the oversight of a new priest. It has recently been announced that Rev'd Mike Edwards (currently Curate at Bengeworth) will be Curate-in-Charge of these two churches from September 2026.
- As you may know, St. Peter's Bengeworth continues to go forward as a separate renewal project, but is also part of the ongoing informal 'Group' of churches known as Asum.

Working Together

Meanwhile, as these changes take place in the coming months, we are very glad to have a team of lay and ordained volunteer ministers who are generously committing themselves to sustain and develop the worship and outreach of our local churches. In the Hampton network, this team has been strengthened in recent months by the licensing of Helen Black as a LLM (Reader) together with Guy Barnard, who has been a Reader for many years, now offering to serve amongst, once he has received his 'Permission to Officiate (PTO)'.

A New Coffee Club

As part of the re-shaping and new collaboration outlined above, various possible developments have been emerging. One of these has already begun – a Coffee Club in Hampton

This has been started in partnership with Rev'd Shellie Ward and takes place at Hampton Farm Shop every Tuesday from 2pm to 3pm (and often over-runs!). It's an informal time where anyone is welcome to join in a chat and meet people over a cup of coffee. The Coffee Club has held an open air Harvest Service with St. Andrew's School within the grounds and a Carol Service at Hampton Farm Shop before Christmas. More events are to be organised in the future.



The Seven Deadly Sins: Pride

Canon Paul Hardingham begins a seven-part series

Our new series looks at the 7 Deadly Sins, a list compiled by Pope Gregory 1 in AD 590 to describe the nature of sin. This month we consider pride, '*the beginning of all sin*' (Augustine).

Pride is preoccupied with self and denies the need for others or God. We see it present in the first sin, when Adam and Eve wanted to become like God.

What does pride look like? Jesus told the story of two men, a Pharisee and a tax collector, who went to pray in the Temple (Luke 18: 9-14). The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: '*God, I thank you that I am not like other people, robbers, evildoers, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.*' (11,12). He illustrates how pride is essentially putting ourselves in God's place and believing we can run our own lives. It's subtle and self-deceptive and eats away our lives: '*Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall.*' (Proverbs 16:18).

So how do we deal with pride? The answer is humility. The tax collector stood at a distance '*he would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'*' (13). This man was right with God, because he acknowledged his sin and his need for forgiveness. Humility is being realistic about ourselves, and acknowledging our total dependence on God. We develop it by giving ourselves wholeheartedly to God and repenting of our desire to do things our way.

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament: Song of Songs

The title of this book, '**Solomon's Song of Song**' (1:1), claims to be written by Solomon, and while his name is mentioned seven times and several verses speak of the 'king', the book may be more about Solomon rather than written by him. However, it is reasonable to assume that Song of Songs was written in the tenth century BC, during Solomon's reign (971-931 BC).

The focus of the Song is God's choicest gifts of love and the voice of this love belongs to a woman, the beloved. It is her experience of love, both as the one who loves and as the one who is loved, that is most clearly expressed. The Song begins with her wish for her lover's kiss and ends with an invitation for intimate love. It describes the intimacies of married love as God intends it to be. She speaks profoundly of love; of its beauty and delight; its exclusiveness (2:16); its spontaneity (2:7) and its overwhelming power: '*Place me like a seal over your heart, like a seal on your arm; for love is as strong as death, its jealousy unyielding as the grave. It burns like blazing fire, like a mighty flame. Many waters cannot quench love; rivers cannot wash it away.*' (8:6,7)

God created man and woman, and established marriage as His purpose for society (Genesis 1:27; 2:20-24). This Song is part of the wisdom literature and shows us how to receive and live the gift of God's love with thanksgiving and celebration. However, the Song also speaks symbolically of the experience of intimacy to be found in our relationship with Christ: '*My lover is mine and I am his...and his banner over me is love.*' (2:16,4).

Plough Sunday

Plough Sunday, traditionally celebrated on the first Sunday after Epiphany, marks the beginning of the agricultural year. This year it falls on Sunday 11 January.



It is a time when farmers and rural communities gather to seek God's blessing on the land and the tools of their trade, offering prayers for a fruitful season ahead. Historically, ploughs were brought into the church to be blessed, a symbol of dependence on God for the success of the harvest.

In today's context, Plough Sunday reminds us of the importance of creation and our responsibility to steward the earth wisely. As we give thanks for the land, we also remember the delicate balance of nature and the need for sustainable practices. Our prayers extend beyond the fields, asking for God's guidance in tackling environmental challenges, promoting food justice, and ensuring that all have access to the fruits of the earth.

The Gifts of the Magi - Epiphany for Today

The gifts the Magi offered point us to how Jesus can answer our present days concerns and worries: '*they bowed down and worshipped Him...and presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.*' (2:11).

The **gift of gold** reflects that the Magi saw in the baby a king, destined to rule over us all. In this coming year we need to remember that Jesus is on the throne, the seat of power and authority in the whole universe. Will we crown Him king of our lives and dedicate all that we are and do to Him?

The **gift of frankincense** reflects that the visitors saw not just an earthly king, but God in human flesh. Incense symbolises the prayers of God's people and so this gift reminds us that God is worthy of our worship and prayer. Will we offer our praise and prayer, as we seek God to guide us through the uncertainties of this coming year?

The **gift of myrrh** reflects that these astrologers saw beyond the baby's birth and life, to His death which would secure life for all. Jesus was offered myrrh on the cross and was a spice used in His tomb. As we face challenges in the future, we can be confident that Jesus knows and understands our experience. Are we ready to trust Him in everything?

'Glorious now behold Him arise, King and God and Sacrifice! Heav'n sings Hallelujah: Hallelujah the earth replies.' ('We Three Kings').

RECIPE - Sticky banana, date & pecan pudding

Ingredients

- 100g stoned dates, chopped
- 150ml whole milk
- 200g butter, softened
- 150g dark soft brown sugar
- 2 very ripe bananas, unpeeled
- 3 medium eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 200g self-raising flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 100g pecans, chopped
- vanilla ice cream to serve



For the sauce

- 100g dark brown soft sugar
- 100ml double cream
- 25g butter

Method

- Put the chopped dates and milk in a saucepan and warm over a low-medium heat until the milk is steaming. Cook for a few more minutes until the dates are soft, then remove from the heat and leave to cool a little.
- Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Tip the butter, sugar, whole bananas (including the skin), eggs, vanilla, flour, bicarb, and the date and milk mixture into a blender. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt and blend to a smooth cake batter. Pour the batter into a deep ovenproof dish and scatter over half the chopped pecans, then stir them into the batter.
- Bake for 45 mins until golden brown and cooked through.
- While the pudding is baking, bubble the ingredients for the sauce in a small pan over a low heat until combined to a glossy toffee sauce, about 5 mins. Stir in a pinch of salt.
- When the pudding is cooked, pour over half the sauce and scatter with the remaining pecans, then return to the oven for 5 mins until the toffee sauce is bubbling. Serve with the remaining sauce and scoops of vanilla ice cream.


Christmas Decorations Deadline

No need to panic- apparently, we don't have to worry about rushing to take down our Christmas decorations by Twelfth Night! Indeed, we will not incur bad luck or attract bad spirits even if we leave them up until the beginning of February as, (according to English Heritage), it was just a rule brought in by the Victorians so that business wasn't affected by continuing celebrations. Mill owners were keen to get the workers back to the looms.

In Medieval times, the Christmas Season lasted 40 days until Candlemas on 2 February, which was a Feast Day marking the presentation of Jesus at the Temple and the Purification of the Virgin Mary. Traditionally, this is the date that all the candles for use in church in the coming year are blessed by the priest. For Christians, these blessed candles serve as a symbol of Jesus Christ, the light of the world. In John 8:12 Jesus said "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life". In the 16th century as a reminder of this, Christians put candles onto Christmas trees, although the risk of fire was considerable. Thankfully, by 1882 the first electrically lit Christmas tree had been developed.

The February date also marks the ending of the darkest quarter of the year. It seems a good idea to me to leave a few festive lights up for a bit longer (until the eve of Candlemas) to keep my spirits up and dispel the gloom!
