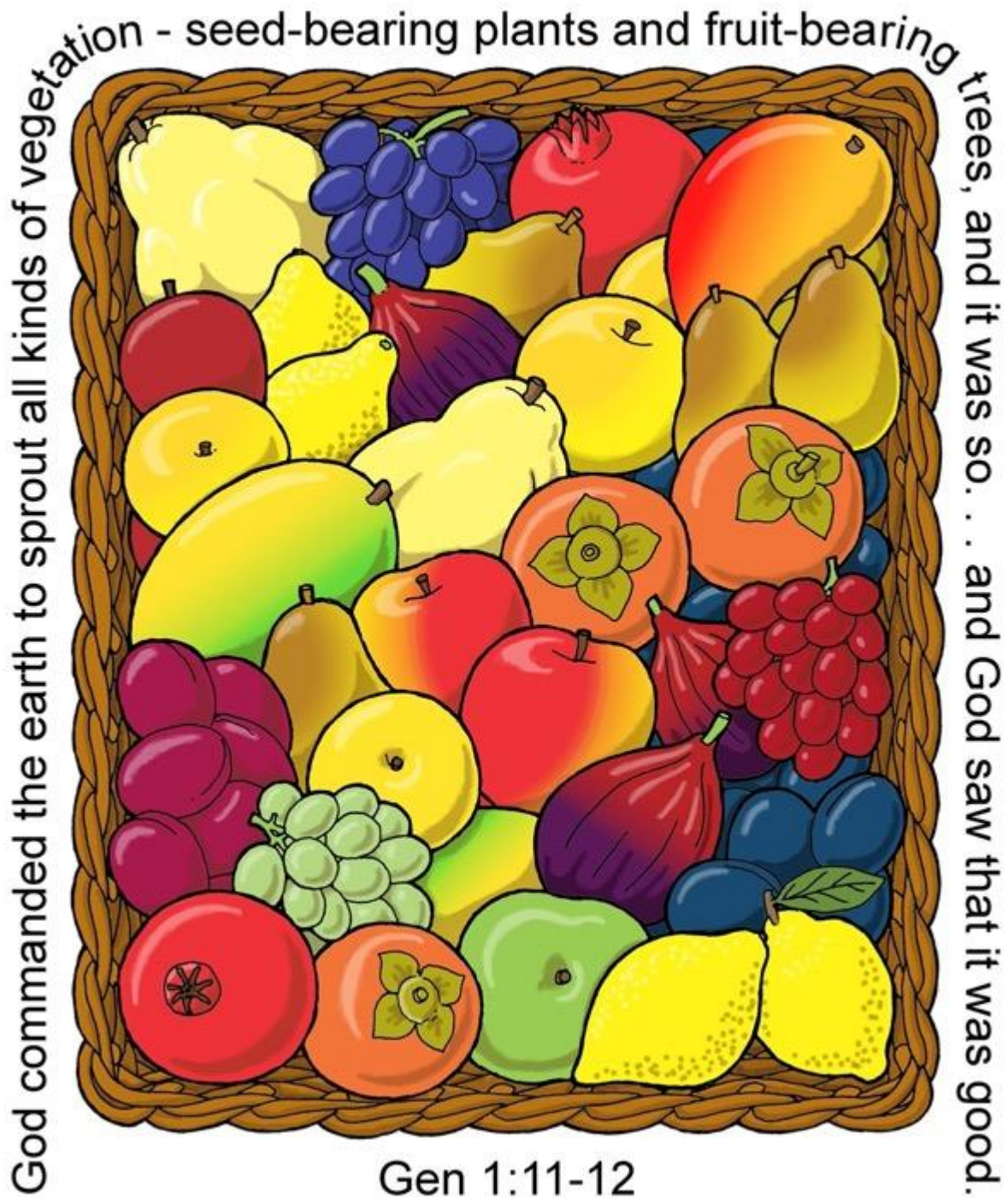

Message from the Bishop of Dudley

As I was writing this article in August, the fields and parks and lawns were burnt and brown, trees were already losing their leaves and the birds seemed lethargic and lost. Although some fields are thick with wheat and barley, I'm not sure how good the grain will be with the ground baked hard. Livestock are already being fed winter feed and farmers must fear for what is to come. It feels as though the climate and the land on which we all depend needs a chance to step back from the brink, and to rest, refresh and reset.

I was able to take a sabbatical break after Easter. After many years in ministry, I was ready for a break. My aim was a simple one. To rest, to refresh, and to reset myself for the next stage of life and ministry here. It was wonderful to turn the alarm clock off and enjoy a diary empty of meetings and obligations. It was wonderful to have time to be with Katharine my wife, and to have an adventure, travelling across China together. It was so good to have time too with my adult children and young grandchildren, with a family week away together. It was an absolute blessing to have time to walk, to pray, to go on retreat, to study, and to finish the time with two weeks of peace and quiet in the beautiful Isles of Scilly. I returned rested and refreshed in

body, mind and spirit, and ready and reset for whatever lies ahead.



Giving our precious planet the chance to rest, refresh and reset is not something I can do on my own. Solutions to the climate crisis are not simple or pain free. They involve commitments at every level from us all, as individuals, churches and communities, and at national and international level. During my sabbatical I discovered that when I slow down and do less, then God has a chance to do more within me and through me. Perhaps as a church and society we need to slow down the pace of relentless change, to let go and let God be God, within us and all around us. To let our loving God lead us to streams of living water, to rest, refresh and reset.

May God Grant You Courage - Message of Solidarity with the People of Ukraine

The Bishop of Worcester, Hugh Nelson, who is the C of E's Bishop to the Armed Forces, recently went to Kyiv to join Ukrainian church leaders, other religious leaders and government officials at the National Prayer Breakfast in Kyiv. Bishop Hugh also met with the leader of the Orthodox Church of Ukraine, His Beatitude Metropolitan Epiphany.

Bishop Hugh brought a message from the Archbishop of Canterbury, Sarah Mullally. She promised that the Anglican Church would continue to "stand in prayerful solidarity" with Ukraine, and she acknowledged the "immense sacrifices" which the Ukrainians are making "in defence of your country, its people and the values of freedom and human dignity".

What's the Big Idea? – an Introduction to the Minor Prophets

The Minor Prophets are '*minor*' not because they lack importance, but due to their length. The 12 prophets, Hosea through Malachi, make up the last books of the Old Testament, and were written from around 770 BC (Jonah) until 433 BC (Malachi).

The prophets fall into 3 time-periods:

Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah and Nahum = Assyrian period

Habakkuk and Zephaniah = Babylonian period

Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi = Post-exilic period.

Hosea and Amos spoke to Israel (Northern Kingdom), calling the people to acknowledge their sin and return to God. Joel and Micah addressed Judah (Southern Kingdom), including prophecies about the coming of the Messiah and the church. Habakkuk and Zephaniah spoke to Judah shortly before they were taken into exile into Babylon. Obadiah spoke God's judgment against the Edomites, while Jonah and Nahum both spoke against Assyria and their capital city of Ninevah. Following the people's return from exile, Haggai exhorted the people not to neglect rebuilding the Temple. Zechariah encouraged them with the promise of the future glory of Zion and of its shepherd king, while Malachi reminded them that if he is rejected, God would judge His people.

The minor prophets remind us that God cared not just for the Jews, but also for the Edomites, Assyrians, Egyptians and all His creation. For Christians today the challenge remains to take the message of God's grace to all nations in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Aberfan: 60 years on

On 21 October 1966 the Aberfan disaster took place in South Wales. A colliery slag heap collapsed, releasing a torrent of slurry onto the village. It engulfed a number of houses and Pantglas Junior School, killing 116 children and 28 adults. It was a disaster that shocked the nation. As we reflect on it today, we are left asking the question, '*where was God when this happened?*'

At the time there was a mixture of strong emotions: grief and sadness over the loss of those who had died, and anger against the Coal Board in allowing the disaster. However, people gave their energy to support each another. A local Baptist Minister, Revd Kenneth Hayes, who lost his eldest son at the school, responded in this way: '*For 36 hours he was working non-stop either at the school, or going around comforting bereaved and stricken families and kept open house for many who came seeking news and comfort.*'

King Charles III (then Prince of Wales) on the 50th anniversary summed up the community's response: '*darkest sorrow, but also the most shining selflessness.*'

Reflected Faith Series:

Editor: The Revd Dr Jo White continues her series on aspects of Christianity

Last time we reflected on the time of 'Receiving and sharing the Peace' within our service. This month, we consider what comes next.

I say 'next' but actually, during that time of sharing the Peace most of us multi-task! We move around saying hello and catching up on the latest news from folk we only see on a Sunday in church; we shake hands and say the words of 'The Peace'; and we also scrabble around looking for cash to put on the plate or in the bag.

Our cash offering to the church is then processed up to the altar to be received by the priest who blesses it and prays over it. (Many years ago, when we were first able to give by standing order to the local church, I recall some people saying they would prefer to continue to give using cash, as the money in the bank was 'not blessed'!)

In more recent years I have attended, and indeed been the incumbent for, churches where no plate or bag is passed around at this point but rather that folk are both encouraged to give by standing order or if by cash then on a plate or in a box as they enter the building.

Some churches today do not bring forward any financial collection, even if there is a plate on entering /leaving.

So what has changed?

It's a reflection of our understanding of the real meaning behind the 'collection'. A reversion to the original intention by the church fathers.

It was never intended to be just a small percentage of our possessions or the leftover cash we have lying around. Instead, it was intended to be an offering of our whole lives. The money was just a visible token.

Clergy at St Andrew's from 1949 to present day

A series of Articles sent in by John Smith - Part 2

Revd. Tim Woods 1966-1972

Revd. Woods arrived at St. Andrews having been the Stewardship Adviser for the Worcester Diocese. He arrived with his wife Mildred and two sons, Michael and David. Michael at that time doing his National Service in the RAF. Mildred was the epitome of a Vicar's wife, in that she was involved with the Mothers Union, Young Wives, flowering arranging and supporting Tim in his ministry. The organ at St. Andrews at that time was facing West and I remember helping Tim to turn the organ so that it faced North with the organist's back to the choir. In those days the altar was situated against the East wall underneath a wooden screen (reredos) which was lowered to enhance the view of the East window.

The pulpit was moved to its current position from the south-east corner of the nave in 1967.

I served as Churchwarden for Tim, and Frances was church treasurer during Tim and Mildred's stay at Hampton. Mildred was also Godmother to our two daughters. After retiring from Hampton they moved to Temple Guiting, living in the vicarage at Lower Swell. Tim always had a type of wanderlust and after retiring from the ministry they moved to Southport to live (2 occasions), Weston-sub-Edge and Tewkesbury, where he assisted at many services at Tewkesbury Abbey.

World Homeless Day

When we recognise all that we have received, we become more aware of opportunities to support others. Harvest is also a reminder that we are stewards of God's creation. The land, the seas, the creatures around us and the resources we enjoy are gifts entrusted to our care. As we give thanks for this year's harvest, we are encouraged to consider how we use those gifts wisely and responsibly.

To qualify for a grant, you must meet the required age as of 1 September 2026

You must also be a permanent resident of the TOWN OF EVESHAM or, if living away from home during term time, maintain a residential address in the TOWN.

All applicants must provide documentation to evidence their residency.

Applicants aged 25 and over are also subject to a financial assessment.

The categories are as follows:

- CATEGORY A:** HND, Degree level and Postgraduate courses at a University or College. Full or part time. (Level 4 HNC courses are only considered if they qualify for Student Finance)
Age: 18 to state retirement age.
- CATEGORY C:** Part-time vocational or educational courses, below degree level must be classed as a part time course by the educational establishment and can be part of a modern apprenticeship/day release scheme. Courses must run for 3 terms or equivalent (60 hours minimum over an academic year). Recreational courses are excluded.
Age: 16 to state retirement age.
- CATEGORY D:** Vocational courses towards a Degree at the Open University or a Degree level distance learning course
Age: 18 to state retirement age.
